





It is our sincere hope that this magazine will help to cement the relations between our National sections and between the amateurs and professionals who represent the backbone of American Fencing.

Every member of the A.F.L.A. will receive American Fencing free of charge. It is one of the benefits derived from their membership. We sincerely hope that all groups, amateur and professional, will give us their support. We want articles of general interest and news items of local events. The pages of this magazine are open to all who love fencing. It is your magazine and we want you to make it interesting and informative.

Now that you have seen the first issue, we will appreciate your views, comments and suggestions. We are offering fencing a medium with a scope never before approached. Let us all make it something worthwhile.

STATEMENT FROM THE AFLA

To the editors of

It is my privilege to announce that AMERICAN FENCING has been designated as the official organ of the Amateur Fencers League of America, and to wish the new publication—the successor to our widely praised A. F. L. A. SECRETARY'S NEWS LETTER—all the luck in the world.

Your enterprise makes possible the realization of an old A.F.L.A. dream: The expansion of the SECRETARY'S NEWS LETTER, without extra cost, into a full-fledged fencing magazine published on a regular schedule. AMERICAN FENCING will print all the material previously carried in the NEWS LETTER plus reports of college and school competitions, technical articles, and other features of interest to all fencing enthusiasts. AMERICAN FENCING, like the NEWS LETTER, will be distributed free of charge to all A.F.L.A. members. The official status of AMERICAN FENCING, therefore, is a simple recognition of these facts.

Servando Jose (Joe) Velarde has been appointed head coach at Columbia University. One of our native-born professionals, he is also one of the youngest varsity coaches in the collegiate scene.

Velarde coached the West Point team during the past three years and under his guidance the cadets won the N.C.A.A. three-weapon championship last spring.

Joe graduated from N.Y.U. in 1946 and captained the varsity in his senior year. He served in the Mediterranean theatre during the war as an Air Force gunner and put in 60 missions.

ANNUAL MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT OF THE AFLA

It is a pleasant tradition for the President of the A.F.L.A. to send this annual greeting to the membership at the opening of each fencing season. It is also an opportunity for comment and exhortation which a new "brass hat" can hardly resist after a quarter century (come next spring) of active membership in the League.

In the perspective of this antiquity, I believe the condition of American fencing is good: We are rapidly regaining the momentum which all sports lost during the war. Fencing in the schools and colleges—the most prolific source of new blood in the game—is growing in numbers and in quality. New divisions of the A.F.L.A. are being formed or reactivated. A new crop of competent and enthusiastic professionals is lending impetus to these developments. Our international prestige has reached new heights. All of these factors are inter-related, and the promise for the future is bright. But we must realize that we are still at the threshold of accomplishment.

Because American fencing is a life-time sport and one which relies for its financing upon the support of fencers rather than of the non-fencing public, the development of the game is intimately tied up with the growth and prosperity of the A.F.L.A. The schools and colleges can introduce American young men and women to the sport which, above all, is most fascinating to the participant; but the young fencer's full enjoyment of a game well played often must await the acquisition of mature skill in the amateur club. Neither the school or college, nor the amateur club, can thrive without the services and devo-

tion of a competent professional; and the professional cannot make a living unless the school, the college, and the amateur club are able and ready to pay him a reasonable compensation. In the last analysis, this means that the A.F.L.A. membership must be large and enthusiastic enough throughout the country to stimulate local youngsters to take up the game, to encourage schools and colleges to add or keep fencing in the athletic program with adequate coaching, to form and maintain financially healthy clubs with resident fencing masters, and to support a comprehensive schedule of local, sectional, and national competition by frequent participation as contestants, officials, and spectators.

Again in the perspective of twenty-five years, I think that the A.F.L.A. membership has not grown as much as it should have, if we are adequately to meet these broad responsibilities for the development of American fencing as a whole. We must keep in mind the fact that the strength of fencing depends entirely upon the amount of effort and money which the fencers themselves are willing to spend on the sport. We must all share the common burden. And the burden will be lighter for each of us, if there are more of us to share it. Accordingly, if you love fencing as I think all of us do, you can help the sport and help yourself by doing all you can to increase your local A.F.L.A. membership and activity.

On behalf of your national officers, I pledge you our full cooperation in this important undertaking.

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The 1949 National Championships had entries from 14 of the League divisions, the most number of divisions ever represented in the National Championships. The foil and sabre fields were quite strong and showed great potentialities. Three contestants from California competing in their first Nationals made a great impression by both their fencing and fine conduct. They were Gerard Biagini and Louis Giorgi of the Olympic Club, and Gary Martin of the Aldo Nadi Studio. Giorgi in sabre and Biagini and Martin in foil can be expected to be nationally known in a few years. All they need is more training and experience.

Col. Umberto DeMartino added great strength to an already strong sabre field. The epee field was not better than last year, while the failure of the three medalists in the 1948 women's championship to enter, as well as the absence of Helene Mayer, the "World's All Time Great," greatly weakened the women's field over previous years.

A new method of running the finals was tried. The eight finalists in each weapon were paired in ten touch bouts (eight touches for the women) in direct elimination. This was a modification of the system tried out this year in the World Championships. The last bout in each weapon was fenced at the "Gala" at the Hotel Roosevelt ballroom and provided the most interesting finals from the standpoint of spectator appeal.

In the team events only one defender was unsuccessful in defense of its title—the N.Y.A.C. in foil. The Salle Santelli kept the titles in the epee, sabre and three weapon team events, while the Faulkner School of Fencing retained the women's title.

In the individual events two title holders did not defend—Helena Dow in women's foil and Dean Cetrulo in sabre. Of the remaining two events, Norman Lewis was successful in his defense of the epee championship, while Nathaniel Lubell was eliminated in the semi-finals in defending his foil title by his clubmate, Dr. Daniel Bukantz.

Salle Santelli Starts Season

The Salle d'Armes Santelli, extending its privileges to out of town fencers, announces that it will again be located at the Henry Hudson Hotel, 57th Street near Ninth Avenue, N.Y.C., on Wednesday and Friday nights.

The following regulations will be enforced to the letter:

ENTRIES must be received in writing by the Executive Secretary (C. L. Tuthill, 509 W. 121 St., N. Y. 27) at least **one week prior to the date set for the competition.** Members in arrears for dues or entry fees may not compete.

COMPETITORS must report to the Bout Committee at least **15 minutes** prior to the scheduled starting time and must be ready to fence when called. Exception may be made only in the event of unavoidable delay which has been explained in advance and authorized by the Bout Committee. Competitors are reminded that they must not loiter in the lobbies or make use of the lounge rooms of the host clubs while still in fencing uniforms.

TEAMS may consist of four members. The winning team will be awarded three medals but will be allowed to purchase a fourth. **Teams with only two members present at the scheduled starting time will be compelled to fence the first match with only those two fencers.** A third member may join his team after the completion of the first match.

The most common fencing fault is having your feet too far apart "on guard." It is an expensive fault, because it shortens your lunge.

ARMAMENT AND EQUIPMENT must comply with the official specifications. For electrical epee competitions a fencer must have available at least **two** satisfactory epees approved by the Bout Committee one hour before the starting time of the competition. Any fencer appearing with a soiled or torn uniform will not be permitted to fence. For women, the costume shall include loose white trousers fastened anywhere below the knee, and the lower edge of the jacket should cover all valid target.

NOTE: All epee competitions will be fenced with the standard epee except as noted on the schedule.

NEWS FROM ABROAD

The following is a summary of a report submitted to the Board of Governors of the A.F.L.A. by the League's Foreign Secretary, Mr. Tracy Jaeckel:

The A.F.L.A. was represented at the 30th Congress of the F.I.E. last June by Mr. Paul Anspach of Belgium. It was pointed out that the United States was now one of the largest members of the F.I.E. The Directoire Technique of the Olympic Games was to be increased from 5 to 7 members, the additional members to represent the Americas.

The Organizing Committee for the Olympic Games wished to reduce the fencing schedule in the 1952 Games. The F.I.E. hopes to maintain the present schedule. The specific proposal of the Organizing Committee was to reduce the teams to three men, with no representation for women at all. The Games will be held July 19 to August 13, 1952.

The F.I.E. announced the abandonment of direct elimination competition. The invalidity of the double touch in epee was also abandoned, and the electrical epee machines were to be changed from 1/15th of a second to 1/25th, thereby eliminating somewhat the possibility of a deliberate double touch being made.

Several important changes have been made in the F.I.E. rules, and in the next issue we will present the major ones as well as those which have been adopted by the A.F.L.A.
