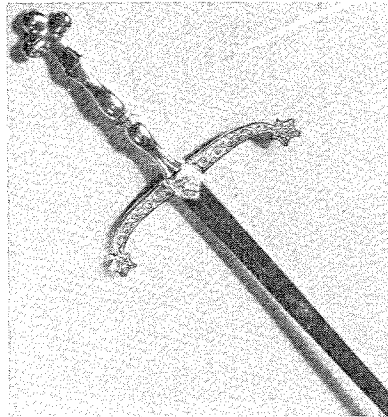

Central American & Caribbean Games

The Xth Games were held in San Juan, Puerto Rico with nine entries competing in the fencing events - Colombia, Cuba, Jamaica, Mexico, Netherland Antilles, Panama, Puerto Rico, Venezuela and Virgin Islands. Tracy Jaeckel was the FIE representative, Daniel Bukantz and George Worth were invited as international directors, and M. Alphonse of France attended as director and representative of the FIE Commission on Juries.

The most notable developments were Cuba's strength in winning six of the eight events, and Mexico's weakness which is due greatly to their youth movement in fencing. The competitions were held in the beautiful Jeronemo Hilton Hotel with excellent equipment and good facilities, but the lack of

experience on the part of the organizers in running this type of event created problems.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER

We believe considerable progress has been made during the 1965-66 season to strengthen our sport and promote the solid base for continued growth.

Membership in our League should approach 3,700. While we had hopes of a greater increase, the results achieved are commendable. We must not relax our efforts to increase the membership and continued solicitation will be undertaken at the National level; corresponding efforts must be continued at the Division level.

Fund Raising for the support of our men and women fencers to help them participate in the 1966 World Championships in Moscow was both encouraging and discouraging.

Encouraging to see so many checks from all sections of the country—small divisions and large divisions alike—with personal notes wishing our fencers well and expressing regrets that the contributions could not be larger.

Discouraging to have so many people remark on the excellence of our campaign yet fail to send their contribution; lethargy is a powerful weapon to overcome.

We want to express our gratitude to all our contributors whose donations approximated \$1,000 and thus provided each contestant with \$100 towards the expense of traveling to Moscow.

The US Olympic Committee granted the AFLA \$9,000 for development of fencing. Proper and judicious use of such funds are earmarked as follows:

Olympic Development Training Camps \$1,500; Junior Olympic Programs (promotional pamphlets, posters, patches, etc.) \$1,000; Production of films and prints \$1,500; Regional fencing clinics \$5,000. Plans are under way to implement the foregoing and Division Chairmen will be contacted regarding the applicability of each phase of their respective divisions.

I want to thank all who so generously gave of their time and efforts to make the 1965-66 season so rewarding. We in the National Office do not pretend to have all the answers to the problems confronting fencing and would welcome constructive suggestions susceptible of adoption on a national basis.

OPEN LETTER

Silvio Vitale, Fencing Master at M.I.T., has posted this letter to his students in the hope of "keeping this now very competitive sport still a little traditional in its courtesies."

"ON GUARD!"

You belong to a fencing society. You should fence with everyone. Fencing novices is good for your morale. Facing average fencers you will get used to different styles, which is good training. Should real champions be around, ask them if they will honor you with a "lesson." If by some freak you should win or score more points against them, please don't go "bragging" that you won - the chances are they were merely "playing" with you. You should know better!

The Fencing Master's, Coach's, or Director's authority should not be challenged by anyone. It must be accepted by all, from the president of the club down. Upon entering the Salle d'Armes your first greeting should be for the director. In fencing circles a member's behavior is far more important than ability on the strip.

Before starting to fence, you must salute your opponent with dignity from a correct, erect position. When spectators are present they must be saluted too.

The mere fact that you handle a fencing weapon should make you feel proud of the sport in which you participate.

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CONTINUE, MR. TOTH

Mr. Toth's analysis of American sabre fencing technique as demonstrated at the last national championships caused a considerable amount of discussion among many of the high school fencing coaches in the San Francisco Bay Area.

While recognizing that the articles opposing his point of view were written by qualified people in our sport, Mr. Toth, an acknowledged expert in the field, should not go unsupported. Agreement with what was written may not be possible for all, but there is a need for the continuance of Mr. Toth's analytical work because it brings us together upon one important subject—our caliber of fencing. What can be done to improve these analyses, or to use them more wisely? A compromise of ideas, at least, must be possible.

There is no doubt that we lead the world in sportsmanship and amateurism for we know how to abide by the rules. Now, what must we do in order to win in the World Championships and the Olympics? What demands are fair to make, not only upon our U.S. fencing teams, but upon our fellow fencers and fencing masters?

We believe Mr. Toth's work can help us toward the day when our fencers will equal the record of our trackmen, swimmers, and basketball players. We think that most fencers could study the analyses with an eye toward finding the most effective actions possible in winning sabre competition.

We look forward to more of Mr. Toth's analytical reports.

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1966 NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Tournament was held at Long Island University's Founders Hall, which is a most unusual gymnasium (the old Brooklyn Paramount Theatre) with gold colonnades, silver fountains, cherubic statues and plush red seats.

Although the East tended to dominate the finals, the entire country was well represented in the early rounds with more than 300 fencers participating. Credit for the planning and facilities goes to the Organizing Committee of Harold Goldsmith, John Farrell, John Geraci, Jack Keane, William Latzko and Alex Solomon.

The events ran smoothly thanks to the hard-working Bout Committee of Daniel Bukantz and Nathaniel Lubell, co-chairmen; Irwin Bernstein, James Canvin, Paul Etter, Manny Forrest, Ralph Goldstein, William Latzko, Norman Lewis, David Micahnik, Denise O'Connor, Arthur Olson, Laszlo Pongo, Carla Mae Richards, Steve Sobel, Edmond Zeisig and Anthony Zombolas. No praise is too high for the technicians who kept the electrical equipment going: Joseph Byrnes, Louise Neill and Vincent Pauly.

One of the brightest aspects of the Tournament was the addition of the Under-19 Championships. Planned with an eye to future Olympiads, the events were designed to provide both incentive and experience for the next generation of U.S. fencers.

John Allarie Memorial Trophy

Max Geuter, in the United States for one year from Germany, captured the foil title. A former German national champion, Geuter lost only one match in the finals, to fifth place Robert Russell, of Salle Santelli, 5-2. Geuter just made it into the finals, finishing 3-2 in his quarter and semi-final rounds. But losses in those rounds to Uriah Jones, who finished second, Ed Richards, NYAC, and Mike Gaylor of New York University, were reversed in the final. The competition for second was extremely close, with Jones taking

it with a 4-3 record and only 20 touches. Heizaburo Okawa was third on touches over Lawrence Anastasi, 1961 national champion, of Salle Csiszar. Albert Axelrod, three-time national champion, was eliminated in the semi-finals with a 1-4 record.

Geuter's closest moment came in his last bout, against Okawa, who already had two losses and had to beat Geuter for a chance at the championship. Geuter went ahead 2-0, but twisted his right ankle trying for his third touch. Okawa tied the score at 2-2 after a two-minute break, but Geuter scored the next touch and held on for the win as the six minute time limit ran out.

Janice Lee Romary of Salle Vince filed her ninth national championship and third in a row in winning the 1966 crown. Jan, a mother of two children, has made successive comebacks after having her children, but is having her most successful now. In the finals, she went through the opposition with a 6-1 record, although she was 3-2 in both the semi and quarter-finals. Her only loss in the finals, to Tommy Angell, 4-3, came after she had wrapped up the championship with a 6-0 record, while Tommy already had two defeats. Tommy, of the Pannonia A.C., was second, while Elissa Botbyl of the Netherlands, fencing for Salle Nord, was third with a 4-3 record, and 22 touches received, nudging out Bonnie Linkmeyer, of the Los Angeles A.C. who had 23 touches. Maxine Mitchell, of the Los Angeles Fencing Club, four-time national champion, was stopped in the semi-finals when she lost a fence-off to Miss Linkmeyer 4-2.

SWORD OF HONOR

Mr. Oscar Kolombatovich presented an authentic replica of a two-handed broadsword to each of the four national champions. The trophy is in memory of the controversial great Aldo Nadi. In requesting and obtaining approval of the Board of Directors, Mr. Kolombatovich wrote:

"I have always felt that the recognition given to our national fencing champions was inadequate. An old book about the great Agesilao Greco confirms my opinion. Along with his medals he would often be given a gold watch, a silver cup (Ed. Note - to keep permanently, not just to hold for a year), or a "sword of honor".

"Too often a medal winds up in a drawer . . . or among many others in a frame where it loses its identity. I would like to offer a "golden" sword of honor for the national champion in each weapon, to be retained by them, and to be called the Aldo Nadi Memorial Award. The sword will be a four-foot two-handed broadsword with the blade appropriately inscribed, with a bracket for mounting it on the wall.

"I would appreciate your proposing this to the Board and, if approved, publishing this letter in American Fencing where it may inspire some other individual or organization to do something comparable for second and third place winners."

FIE CONGRESS, PARIS, MAY 1966

by C-L de Beaumont

Thirty one countries were present and thirty represented by proxy. The FIE now has 68 affiliated countries, almost double the number in 1946. Licenses have risen from 21 in 1946 to 44, 808 in 1965. Only ten countries (including Great Britain) make the holding of an FIE license a condition of individual membership in their national organizations.

An International Committee is to be appointed as adviser to the FIE Bureau. It will consist of the past Presidents of the FIE and five Counsellors representing the continents of Africa, America, Asia, Europe, and Oceania. A counsellor will be appointed for any continent having less than 2000 FIE licenses, but that event additional European counsellors could be appointed. Appointments are made by the President of the FIE.

Henceforth one woman shall be included in each of the permanent commissions. The following were elected:

Johna Elik (Hungary) - Statutes
 Mme. Boisson (France) - Rules
 Mme. Katarinska (Bulgaria) - Judges
 Mme. I. Camber (Italy) - Propaganda
 All matters concerned with Technical Rules, will be decided according to the number of votes as allotted to each country (Scale of Votes). Proxy votes, limited to general matters, are limited so that no nation can exercise more than one proxy. Technical matters, subject to the Scale of votes, are not subject to proxy votes.

It was agreed that the International Fencing Masters Federation should appoint a Commission of not more than nine members whose president would have the right to attend meetings of the FIE Commissions for Rules, Judges, Electrical Equipment, and Propaganda in a consultative capacity without vote.

the North Atlantic Sectional Championships at Northeastern University in Boston, four new champions were crowned - for the first time. None of last year's champions were able to compete due to physical injuries or grounded flights to Japan.

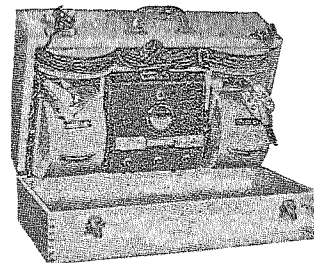

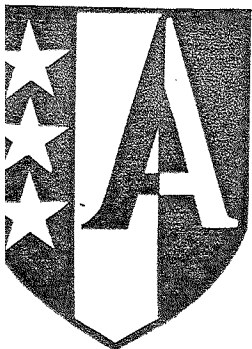

BOOK REVIEW CORRECTION

by Albert Manley

Mr. William J. Latzko erred in his book review (AMERICAN FENCING, May, 1966), stating that John Kardoss' book is the only English text that deals exclusively with sabre. Certainly Roger Crosnier's "Fencing with the Sabre" has had wide circulation, and cannot be overlooked for its systematic presentation of class work. Most recently, Beke and Poltgar's "Methodology" has become available in the United States, and gives the most thorough and complete explanation of technique, training and competitive preparations as currently practiced in Hungary.

We have not seen Mr. Kardoss' book. It may have many excellent features, but the date given is 1955, so that it may be somewhat obsolete. Prof. Crosnier's text certainly is derivative, a French master's view of supposedly "Hungarian" method, as well as being more than ten years old. The "Methodology" of Beke and Poltgar is the latest word, but as a manual for beginners and coaches suffers from lack of illustrations. This book assumes the reader is an expert and has himself been thoroughly trained in the method described.

Perhaps we should say that the fencer or instructor should have all three books on his shelf. Comparison of the illustrated texts

should prove to be corrective. The coach who can not pursue the year-round, five-days-a-week program of the European system may select a few features which will be beneficial and broadening. Study of Crosnier and Kardos might very well provide better understanding of the verbal descriptions in "Methodology," and the result could be an improvement in sabre instruction and competition in the United States. We have some Hungarian masters, and other Europeans directly trained in that school, to provide the first-hand experience, the lessons and the advice at the side of the practice strip or at the competition hall.

Maestro Toth's analysis (AMERICAN FENCING, March, 1966) has indicated areas in which American sabreplay is undeveloped. Beke and Poltgar offer some conception of the stunningly vast amount of material in those areas. Possibly the situation in the United States can never allow the time for complete mastery of all that technique, nevertheless some practice beyond "1-2" and "parry-riposte" ought to help improve our sabreurs. Book study is not always and entirely fruitless, given coaches with the understanding and will to go into a diversity of actions, and fencers patient enough to work beyond the simple stuff that will succeed in this year's competitions.

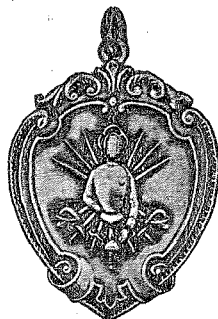
