

LETTERS TO THE EDITORS

IN RESPONSE TO DR. ZOLD by Julio M. Castello

In reference to your article "Modernize Your Sabre" (which I would call "Modernize Your Sabre Rules) in the February issue, I am glad to accept your invitation for

It is nothing new in the game to touch and parry. The same would be true after any broken time action as after a successful attack or parry-and-return. We must not forget that fencing is the art of touching without being touched, even if the adversary tries to hit with an unjustifiable redoublement after being touched. We should always practice to try to come out of the action, if possible, untouched.

This has always been a difficult thing to do, but the practice of this is very beneficial towards the development of a good fast hand. Assuredly, this practice should be encouraged and your suggestion of allowing two touches to the defensive fencer is a very good idea to introduce into the sabre rules. I would even say to allow as many touches as have been scored by fencer before he is touched, he scores off target, or before the director calls halt.

Please notice that I do not only include touches made by stop-cut and parry and return but also after a successful remise or redoublement in both directions, etc.

To make it more graphic, I will cite several personal experiences relating to this same problem. While I was touring in exhibitions, many occasions arose when I was forced to fence with individuals who were not well versed in the rules of the game, and after I had touched them they would in turn hit me too. This provoked the individual to state "you touched me first, but I touched you too". Since most of the audiences were equally unfamiliar with the rules, you can easily see that the only way to prove myself superior was to touch and parry and touch again as many times as was necessary.

I have used this example to show that although your suggestions are right they are by no means modern, for I have cited an example which occurred to me fifty years ago. Believe me, Doctor, there is nothing basically new in fencing today, neither in sabre, foil, nor duelling sword. I will nevertheless state that the rules could stand such an improvement and in this I am with you 100% - and more.

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CLASSIFICATION OF 'A' AND 'B' FENCERS AND RATING OF GROUP I AND II COMPETITIONS

by Abram D. Cohen, Chairman Classification Committee

From a practical standpoint it is impossible for the Classification Committee, with the records now available to it, to provide a complete and accurate listing of A and B fencers. All divisional executive committees are requested to apply Rules 521-527 and determine the individual status of their fencers and file a report as suggested below.

The national body cannot assume that any sectional or divisional events of the past two seasons were Group I or II because of the inequality of strength of competing fields from year to year. Therefore, if a division or fencer feels that a name should be added to the list of A or B fencers published in the December 1956 issue of American Fencing, the request for such classification must contain the following information:

- 1. Name and year of each event believed to qualify the fencer for classification.
- 2. Number of competitors in each event.
- 3. Names of officially designated A and B fencers in each event.

On the basis of reports thus received, a new listing of Class A and B fencers will be published at the beginning of the 1958-59 season.

The criteria for determining Group I and II competitions has been established as follows:

Group I

- (1) A minimum of 18 contestants.
- Not less than 3A and 1B fencers, or 2A and 2B fencers.

Group 1

- (1) A minimum of 12 contestants.
- (2) Not less than 3A fencers, or 2A, 1B and 1C fencers, or 1A and 2B fencers, or 1A, 1B and 2 C fencers, or 2B and 3C fencers, or 3B and 1C fencers.

In order to qualify for Group I or II roting the competition must meet standard (1) and one of the combinations of standard (2) in its respective grouping.

For the 1957-58 season only, competitions will be reviewed retroactively and the 1958-59 competitions will be rated on the caliber of the 1957-58 showing. The 1959-60 events will be rated on the caliber of the previous two seasons. After that, as a matter of policy, when reviewing ratings for each ensuing season, the Classification Committee will be guided by the size and quality of an event for the previous three seasons. If the committee at any time feels that for two consecutive seasons the caliber of the event has not maintained expected standards, that event will be given a lower rating.

All requests for Group I and II ratings for this season's 1957-58 events must be in the hands of the Classification Committee by July 15th together with the following information:

- (1) Name of event and requested rating.
- (2) Number of competitors.
- (3) Name of Class A, B and C fencers participating.

A GENERATION AGO ---

(Taken from 1937-1938 issues of Riposte)

Nadi on U.S. Fleching

Ed. Note: Aldo Nadi wrote regularly for the Riposte. His sharp pen was as explosive as his renowned lunge. The following was written after a foil competition.

"The time has come to say what we think of the fighting ways of too many fencers in this country. Who ever told them to use the fleche in foil as an ordinary attack? . . . It isn't that we condemn a priori an attack which requires only good timing and light feet. But when we see that constantly the fleche is executed by everybody, we think it is our duty to call a stop to such an absurd, extravagant, dangerous (somebody was killed in the Paris championships by a fleche) and non-technical way of attacking your opponent. He who uses the fleche undersigns his lack of technique. Anybody can attack in fleche, even a beginner. But how many fencers in this country know how to execute a balestra perfectly?

"Also, the fleche as it is practiced here bewildered the writer. You see the attacker run beyond his opponent for many yards . . . falling sometimes amongst the spectators . . . always leaving the strip! And what is the idea of ALWAYS going off the side of the strip, even without a fleche? (Note, Mr. Giolito)."

Helena Mayer World Champion

Helena Mayer, U.S. Champion in 1934, '35 and '37, regained the World Crown she had held in 1928 by defeating the 1936 Olympic Champion Ilona Elek of Hungary and the 1932 Olympic Champion Ellen Preis of Austria. The 1937 championship was held in Paris.

Marzi of Italy won the men's foil title; Schmetz of France the epee; Kovacs of Hungary the sabre.

Lt. Thomas Sands, USA, reached the epee final and placed fifth.


HANS HALBERSTADT

The grand old man of Pacific Coast fencing, Hans Halberstadt, is now 73 and still actively teaching at his own Salle d'Armes in San Francisco which opened in 1941.

Mr. Halberstadt, who also coaches at the Olympic Club, is one of the few to hold the "Golden Plaquette," an honor award conferred by the German National Fencing Association, the West German equivalent of the AFLA.

Given in recognition of his more than 50 years of service to international fencing, the award was received this March and was accompanied by a citation praising Mr. Halberstadt's performance in four Olympic Games and many international championships as well as his success in building his new life in the United States.

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Development in Fencing

There is always the question how to boost interest in fencing, and how to increase membership in the A.F.L.A. To Stephen J. Zielinski, chairman of Western New York Division, that has always been a challenge. Several months ago, he heard through the grape-vine that there was a fencing group in Erie, Pa. After exchange of correspondence with Jim Long of Erie, Pa., a trip of 100 miles was made. Accompanying Mr. Zielinski, were Dr. Geza Pokay, Charles Jacobs. Nancy Zielinski and Marcia Richmond. all members of the Western New York Division. The Buffalo group fenced with several fencers of Erie, Pa., who were instructed by Jim Long and Dr. L. J. Ognibene. Plans were made with the group to hold a tournament, sponsored by the newly formed Erie Fencing Club, Mr. Zielinski, with Charles Jacobs, made necessary arrangements for the meet, secured medals and certificates to be given to each entry, and so on March 24th, the Erie Fencing Club held its first foil tournament. Entry by invitation was limited to Novice fencers. The participants were: from Erie, Pa., Joe Gauthier, Harry VanAggelakos, Lou Alexis, and Dr. L. J. Ognibene; from Buffalo, Cecil La Grange, Mike Maleniak, Cleveland, Pete Homorody, Roy Lipstrau and Joe Huszar, The program was well advertised by newspaper, radio and television in Erie, Pa., and drew many spectators. Medals were donated by Lou Alexis, restauranteur of Erie. The entry fee went to the Division's World Championship Fund. The officials were Dr. Geza Pokay, Charles Jacobs, and Nancy Zielinski from Buffalo, New York; Al Styler and Herbert James from Cleveland, Ohio. The results of the tournament were: 1st, Roy Lipstrau, 2nd, Hugh Anderson, 3rd, Joe Huszar and 4th, Dr. L. J. Ognibene. Thus a small fencing group in Erie, Pa. has been ,by proper cooperation. encouraged to develop, and may someday grow into a division. At the present time, some of the Erie fencers have become members of the Western New York Division.

NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Illinois won the over-all title at the fourteenth annual NCAA tournament, held at Texas Tech in Lubbock, The champions finished the two-day tournament with 47 victories, a margin of four over second-place Columbia. The event limits each school to one entry per weapon and Coach Maxwell Garrett's men moved into the winner's circle when Art Schankin went through 21 sabre bouts without a loss on the second day. Besides Schankin, Illinois fielded Abbey Silverstone in foil and Lee Sentman in epee.


The foil title was retained by defending champion Bruce Davis of Wayne State with a 15/2 record. John Norton of Yale placed second on touches over Illinois' Silverstone.

Midshipman R. R. Womack gave Navy the epee crown with 16/2. Columbia's Steve Buchman placed second Ronald Farrow of Notre Dame nosed out Yale's Jay Powell for third on touches.

Runner-up to Schankin in sabre was Frank Parisi of Columbia, followed by NYU's Mike De Saro.

Twenty-five schools participated, but several failed to field complete teams.



Middle Atlantic Intercollegiates

With a surprising show of power, Stevens Institute of Technology dominated the opposition in foil and epee and won the three-weapon title. This was the 7th annual championships and the victory was all the more gratifying because Stevens had been unable in the past to gain a single gold medal in either individual or team competition. The winners are coached by Clifford W. Kirmss.

The foil individual ended with Nick Mestanos of Stevens defeating his team mate, Bill Scheffer in a fence-off. Third place went to Weiss of Johns Hopkins.

Stevens' crushing foil victory was duplicated in epee when the team captain Les Pia placed first and his partner Ira Chapman won the silver medal. Third went to Wismer of Lehigh.

The sabre team title was much closer, as only two bouts separated the top three teams. Lehigh, defending 3-weapon title-holder, won this crown when Shoffler and Nesslace placed second and third in the individual. The new sabre champion is Shafstein of Temple whose efforts enabled his school to place over Stevens by one bout.

The championship was held at Muhlenberg College in Allentown. Next year's host will be Stevens.

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I.F.A. CHAMPIONSHIPS

The Intercollegiate Fencing Association, composed of the major eastern colleges, held its annual tournament in New York City on March 14 and 15.

Team Events

Columbia took the coveted 3-weapon crown by a surprisingly wide margin of five points; surprising because each of the three team championships was a very tight race and the winner could not be determined until the final match. Coach Irving De Koff's men also won the sabre team title and tied for second in both the foil and epee. A first-bout injury to the defending epee champion, Jim Margolis, forced his withdrawal and probably cost Columbia a third crown.

Cornell's Thomas, Cole and Wiley scored 24 victories in the epee to give the Big Red its first team crown in thirty years. It was a perfect tribute to George Cointe on his twenty-fifth anniversary as fencing master at Ithaca. Columbia and Penn tied for second.

N.Y.U., coached by Hugo Castello, won the Little Iron Man trophy emblematic of foil supremacy. The champions, using Alessio, Davis and Kedish, scored 26 victories for the highest total in any of the team events. Columbia and Navy tied for second. Yale was fourth despite the brilliant performance of John Norton who not only posted the tournament's only undefeated record, but was touched only 11 times in his 11 victories.

Columbia's sabre championship was won by Bloom, Parisi and Golden with 25 victories. This title and the 3-weapon crown were uncertain until the last two matches when they showed their true mettle under pressure by defeating NYU and CCNY 2-1. The last named colleges tied for second.

Individual Events

John Norton, Yale's captain, won the crown with a 4/1 record and thus finished

two days of fencing with a grand total of 15/1. Ronald Alessio of NYU, Norton's only conqueror, placed second on touches over his teammate Martin Davis and Navy's Ed Studer.

In the epee Princeton's Paul Levy was forced into a triple tie with Stephen Buchman of Columbia and James Powell of Yale. Levy was cool under pressure and earned the crown. Buchman defeated Powell for second.

Another fence-off was required to determine the sabre champion when Mike Desaro of N.Y.U. faltered in the regular round and lost 5-2 to Frank Parisi of Columbia. Desaro rose to the challenge in the fence-off and turned the tables by defeating Parisi 5-2. Third went to Yorke Peeler of Prince-

COACH OF THE YEAR

Well deserved honors have been heaped on Columbia's head coach of fencing: the National Fencing Coaches Association has elected him its president and he received the award as "Coach of the Year" at the conclusion of the recent NCAA championships in Texisa.

The current success of his pupils is witnessed on these pages and the Columbia record during his short 6-year tenure is most impressive: in 1954 his team achieved the unique distinction of winning the foil, epee, sabre and three-weapon IFA titles and tying NYU for the NCAA championship; between 1954 and 1958 they won the NCAA title twice and were second the other three times; they have won the IFA sobre team title four times and the lvy League Championships the past three seasons. His men have won 13 All-American awards, 5 individual NCAA and 2 IFA titles. With a strong dual meet schedule they have won 59 and lost 8.

"Irv" received his BA in Psychology from Brooklyn College and then an MA in Physical Ed from NYU. He started teaching fencing at the Julliard School of Music in 1947, taught for a year at Cooper Union and then was assistant at Columbia to George Santelli and later Joe Velarde. He also assisted James Montague at CCNY for a brief period and in 1952 was appointed Associate in Physical Education and Head Coach of Fencing at Columbia. He received his fencing training from Joe Velarde, Anthony Greco and Joe Smith. He served in World War II with the Army Signal Corps and was in the South Pacific for two years.

He is married to Belle Kerner, a former NYU student, and has two prospects for the 1968 Women's Olympic Team with a third Olympian expected to arrive soon.




