

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS - 1967

Paul Etter, Chairman Bout and Organizing Committees

About 300 fencers will compete in the 1967 National Championships June 24 through July 1 at Santa Monica, California.

The competitions are being organized to create more spectator and media interest. As a result, the plan for the Nationals departs from the traditional format in several minor respects, but not at the expense of the interests of the competitors.

dy cords will be checked for continuity, s, and regulation connectors. Each fencer be equipped with at least two working cords, which have been certified.

ncers must appear in clothing which orms to the rules. This includes stockings fully cover any part of the leg not red by trousers. Gloves will be checked as They must cover enough of the fore-to protect the fencer against having ade enter his sleeve.

In foil, men and women must have at least two metallic vests that conform to all specifications and that have been certified by the technician. The mask must conform to Rule 217-c, in addition to the other rules above. Foils will be checked for length of blade, length of weapon, trip travel, insulation of the grip, and legality of grip. You should check your foils to see that the spring in the tip will return a 500 gram weight easily, as this test will be made on the strip as well as during the certification of weapons.

In epee, fencers will be checked to ascertain that they are wearing an underarm protector. Points will be checked for conformity to rules 732 and 733. Older weapons still having the 3.5 mm threading for affixing the button will be rejected.

All sabre blades will be checked for length, width and thickness.

The guards of all weapons will be checked for conformity with the rules. All blades will be checked to determine if they pass the test for curvature (rules 308 and 406).

In addition to the tests above, it has been deemed advisable that all fencers who anticipate participating in upcoming F.I.E. competitions should have their weapons checked for flexibility. This test will not be a part of the official certification procedure at the Nationals. However, our technicians will be happy to make this test, at a convenient time during the day, for those fencers who are planning to enter the F.I.E. events. The flexibility test, incidentally, will be made only on foils and epee.

Good luck in the Nationals! We'll take care of the safety and fairness of equipment.

WARSAW CUP

After a lapse of two years the U.S. again took part in the extremely tough Wolody-jowoska International Sabre Tournament in Poland.

Eight teams took part. The cup was won by Russia (7/0), followed by Poland "A" (6/1), Italy (4/3), Hungary (3/4), USA (3/4), France (2/5), Poland "B" (1/6) and East Germany (0/7). In the individual event Mavlichanov of Russia won his third gold medal. Poland's Piatkowski and Pawlowsky were next, followed by three Russians: Sidiak, Nazlimov and the USSR champion Vinocurov.

The U.S. team of Al Morales, Mike Dasaro, Alex Orban, Jack Keane and Wally Farber, with Chaba Gall as alternate, made a deep impression. Although the team placed fifth several experts rated it higher:

The first opponent was the very powerful Russians who used their strongest line-up and won a clean and enthusiastic match 10/6. Dasaro and Keane each won two and Orban and Morales won one each. There were eight 5-4 bouts and the Russians won seven of them. Even though the score was 10/6, the touches were tied at 66! The President of Jury, Cjakowska, gave us the following critique — "your technique is as good as the best here, but you need more bout concentration and your tactics can stand polishing."

We lost to Poland "A" also by 10/6. For the U.S., Dasaro won 3, Orban 2, Keane 1.

AMERICAN FENCING

Orban defeated Ochyra 5-0 in a beautiful bout. Hungary was our third opponent. The match was fenced at a high leevl under an excellent Polish President but a weak jury. Dasaro and Morales each won two, Orban and Keane one each.

We then met France and won 11/5. Morales, Orban, Dasaro and Farber allowed only Parent to take two, while LeFevre, Valle and Panizza each got one. Our next victim was Poland "B" by 9/7 with Orban winning 3 and Dasaro, Farber ad Morales two each. We thus could place third if we beat Italy and East Germany. We lost to Italy 9/7 with Montano winning four and final bout. The team fenced well but in hard luck. Morales, Orban and Keane won two each and Dasaro one. Rigoli, who lost only five bouts to all the other teams, was defeated three times in this one. The match against East Germany was won 11/5 with Keane taking four. Dasaro and Morales three each, and Farber



RECENT FIE RULES CHANGES

Rewrite 3rd paragraph, article 18

He will, in any case, before each bout control the pressure of the spring in the point of the electric weapons and, for the Epee, the total travel and the residual travel of the pointe d'arret:

"—the total travel when introducing between the pointe d'arret and the button a thickness gauge of 1.5 mm; and

"—the residual travel on introducing between the pointe d'arret and the button a thickness gauge of 0.5 mm, application of pressure on the pointe d'arret shall not cause the registering of the apparatus."

Article 327

The fact that the fencer who is signaled as touched finds his blade broken is reason to annul the touch scored on him by his adversary, unless the breaking of his blade happens clearly after the touch is registered.

Article 654

Change the end of the second paragraph to read -

"—at the first order to do so by the President or if he appears with equipment in bad working order." etc.

Article 28

Change by adding the following paragraph -

"The fencer on the pistle must keep his mask on until the decision has been given by the President of the Jury or the Director (sanction of Section 657 apply)."
