## From the President

At the 1978 Nationals in Hollywood, Florida, in addition to the usual twelve official events, there were iwo others of an informal nature: women's epee and sabre. Twentyfour women fenced in the epee event. During the meeting of the Board of Directors held at the Nationals, we considered a request from a second section to hold official championships in these events. Prior to the Nationals, we received an mquiry from a member of the U.S. Congress active in the women's rights movement as to the status of our women's fencing. It's about time this issue came out of the closet

The AFLA first recognized women's epee and sabre in Feb. 1973 when the Board of Directors, meeting in Woodland Hills, Callomia, considered ways in whioh orderly progress could be made. The proponents of this expansion had a variety of motives. Some were serious fencers whose participation was limited by the paucity of able women fencers in their areas. They were often frustrated by traveling hundreds of miles for a very small women's foil competition and were anxious to broaden their fencing opportunities. Some were oriented towards women's rights and were jealous that men could fence in three weapons (even though many did not) whlle they had only one open to them. The opponents also had a mixture of objections. Some were traditionalists who were concerned with the fragiliy of the female - in practical terms as well as image. Others felt that until the FIE conducted epee and sabre events for women, our women should concentrate on foil in order to improve our pool of international compettors. In resolving the issue, then Board of Directors took a temperate position by providing for gradual, controlled growth, not to satisfying any outside political pressure, but to assist our dedicated women fencers to enlarge their fencing horizons. We emphasized the supreme importance of proper safety procedures since those unfamiliar with the heavier, stiffer epee could be injured if they did not wear appropriate protective gear. We also established reporting procedures so that we could extend championship recognition when approp-

rlate; we did not want to undermine the prefiate, we the existing sectional and the pretitles which are eamed in competitions of significant size and strength.
In the five years that have elapsed, much has happened in women's epee and sabre. The Pacific Section has developed these events to official Sectional Championship status through carefully run competitions. In certain other areas serious women fencers have also nutured this growih by trying to interest their associates. In some instances, however, women have fenced epee in foll uniforms, despite our strong prohibition of this, thereby jeopardizing their own safety and the orderly progress of the "movement" In a more subtle way, women not psychologically prepared for epee and sabre have sometimes been coerced by their associates into participating in order to inflate the numbers. Reporting has been erratic, ranging from a regular newsletter published on the west coast to complete failure to report. The word "championship" has been used loosely in some cases, while in others, Division administrators have ignored legitimate requested to hold such events on a trial basis. It is difficult for the AFLA leadership to distinguish between healthy progress and dangerous play

In trying to plot a course for the future, there are several considerations. For international development, some people suggest that if the FIE is going to adopt women's epee and sabreeventually, we shouid seek a headstart. Some also believe that an exposure to epee point control and sabre distance concepts can benefit the women foll fencers, while others claim that the foll is still the basic weapon and cannot be helped by the others. For domestic development, it is difficult to disagree will the idea that having three weapons to fence will bring more women into the sport, and we certainly need more fencers. Weighing the various factors involved, I have reached my own conclusion. It is time for us to provide a more post tive climate for women's epee and sabre for our senous fencers, including assisting in training them in fencing and officiating in

The 1978 National Championships were held at the Diplomat Hotel in Hollywood, Florida from June 24th through July 1st. It was an interesting Nationals from several aspects. Favorites and past champions met the grim reaper in early rounds as new faces began emerging in later rounds some successfully climbing to the finals. The level of the Under 19 fencing showed a surprising level of competence and strength which should brighten our international future considerably. ably more bearable. One cannot also over emphasize the convenience of living wilfin easy walking distance of the compeltion area to say nothing of eating and recreation facilities being right athand. Those of us who have held competitions in nice shiny gyms also encountered severe problems. In wooden floored gymnasiums, strips cannot be taped down, on composite floors everytime a weapon is touched to the floor screams of anguish are heard from all quarters. Also, no tood, no drinks, etc, etc, ad nauseum. Insurance rates in gymnasiums are structured much higher than in a hotel venue. I might also point out that hotel convention halls and surrounding sites have been sites for championship tennis, gymnastics, boxing and golf tournaments Alfredo Duran boxed a World Championship bout at the Founlainbleu just down the road from the Diplomat earlier this year. It's also easier to get help wilh facilities and publicity from a commercial site rther than a public one.

One final note, I believe should be given serious consideration. by our National governing body. As pubticily coordinator. I became painfully aware of the shortcomings of our sport. We complain of the relative obscurity of fencing, of uncooperative and umisymoathetic media and its paucity of spectators I discovered while handling publicity that the way National fencing championships are scheduled they are virtually impossible to cover by media. Rother than hostility, I experienced a frustrated media, begging for results to make deadlines, for information of times when defending champions will be fencing. We fence our finals from midnight to 2 oclock or later in the moming. Only the sabre finished at a reasonable time TV and newspapers have deadlines to meet TV at 5:00 p.m. and 10:00 p.m. for picture stories, $10: 30$ for printed news. Newspaper deadlines for morning papers are 10.30 p.m. for the cily edilions and $12: 00$ midnight for late editions. As we are currently running events, we cannot get adequate coverage. Also spectators will not stay til 3 a.m. to watch a four man barrage to decide the epee title Looking ahead to the future, it gets worse. Besides individual and team titles in womens foil, mens sabre, foil and epee and under 19 events in all four weapons ove the horizon one can see the rumblings of
womens individual and team events in epee and sabre. An informal and spontaneous competition was organized by the ladies this year in sabre and epee. When this trend blossoms into fruition, we are facing not an overloaded 8 day schedule but an impossible 12 to 14 day meeting. The league should consider holding either separate mens and womens toumaments or separate individual and teams or holding the Under 19 competition at another time and place. This would lighten the load in many areas, economically, timewise and facilitate better publicity for our sport.
All in all, the event was enjoyable and run smoothly. One of the highlights occurred when Ralph Zimmerman made good his threat to tear up Irwin Bernsteins directors card if he allowed the Epee final to end in a fence off. When a four man barrage ensured, Ralph ceremoniously shredded the card and showered lowin with the confetti. Maybe, someday we'll do it all again, and maybe next time we'll give birth to lwins or maybe triplets. So next year we move from sea level South Florida to mile high Colorado. Good

heard a funny story about a fencer's troubles some time back. Manny Forrest told me of an epee man who had three (or maybe it was more) weapons, one after another, all fall to function as he brought them, probably with increasing desperation, up to the strip He couldn't understand it; after all, he had just checked each of them with his checker, and the little light lit every time.

That may not sound like something very funny to your average fencer (it could happen to youl), but to a technician, it's a rea chuckle. But then, all technicians develop a sadistic sense of humor, don't we? Well, what was wrong with all three of those epees? Why did they check out OK, if they wouldn't work? And what's so funny? The answers lie in the tester the fencer was using. It has one lamp that lit to show that the point switch was making contact, and that was all. What else was happening to each of those epees was something that a one lamp hook-up like that simply cannot show. Every time the point switch closed, there were actually two contacts being made: one that would normally cause the touch signal, and another that abnormally grounded it out. Without a two-lamp tester, you wouldn't know that very necessary thing about an epee. A one-lamp test hook-up would be fine for foll, but even there it is limited, since you can't test a body cord with it - - unless it's a lot more flexible than the one we are talking about. The really hard-luck aspect of Manny's story is that the poor epee man had three cluck epees, all with the same kind of troubles: it suggests he may have been doing something wrong in assemblywholesale. (If the story still doesn't seem funny, sorry about that, but you'll never be a technician: it is the sort to break us up.)
I've written on this subject before, but not recently, so here goes again. The drawing that accompanies this article should explain the principle, besides proving that I never took mechanical drawing. I should apologize, I suppose, to technological purists for the looks of this thing. It is defimitely not an electrical or electronic "schematic": neither is it a "pictorial" "mnot sure just what it should be classified as, but

With the sort of insistence on good equipment that reigns nowadays, and with penalties being imposed in compositon for failures that you didn't catch in time, a fencer really ought to have the extra protection of one of these simple gadgets. You can build it, or have it built, or buy it. Suit yourself; but do yourself a favor: get one.

## FENCING GLOSSARY

Quarte (S): Position that protects the left side, point higher than the hand with tranchant turned to the left, the thumb up.
Quinte (F.E.): Position covering the dedans (inside, high) taken in pronation, the point higher than the hand.
Quinte (S): Position that protects the head and shoulders, hand to the right, palm facing forward, tranchant up, the blade close to horizontal.
Raccourci (bass) (to draw in, to shorten): An expression that describes an offensive movement with an incomplete extension of the arm
Rassemblement (Gather together): Position where a fencer has drawn his legs and feet together. It can be done with a forward or backward movement. Often used as a salute or at the end of a lesson. It is also a counter offensive action combined with a coup d'arret (stop thrust).
Redoublement: A second offensive action which can be simple, composed, or preceded by actions on the blade. It is executed in a lunge or fleche after a return on guard (forvard or back). The evolution of fencing brings us to include the term redoublement in the "reprises"
Remise: A second offensive action, which consists in replacing the point in the same line without withdrawing the arm or an action
on the adversary's blade. It against opponents who parry wit ing, riposte in lost time or make ar composed riposte. The push-lunge he descri suggests can only work if the $\mathrm{f}_{1}$ adopted a rather exaggerated foi or forward weight-displacement $t$ lea. If one attemots a nush-luni

centered position of "on guard," the straightening of the rear leg immediately pushes the body up, rather than forward; and one ends up with a serious "up and down" or "over the barrel" lunge. Although Mr. Every no doubt finds great success with his push-lunge, I cannot help but wonder A) about his initial "on guard" position, and B) how much more effective he would be with a correctly executed lunge.

The correcllunge is actually in three parts and the coordination of these three sets of moves takes a long time to master so they are assimilated into one smooth motion again. Most fencers except the really good ones never bother, replying on hand-work and fierce competitive attitudes to carry them through thier meets.

Ideally, the lunge in foll has the following serialized (one after the other) sequence of leg moves (one assumes that the forward am has already begunits extension to attain right of way)-A) the front foot kicks out--it kicks out, and not up, with the toe up and the heelleading the motion forward. This has the effect of beginning the body motion forward, bringing the center of gravity to the point where B) the rear leg can be driven straight, rather like a piston, to propel the body forward-at this point the rear arm begins its hard (and supinated) backward motion; when the rear leg is $80 \%$ to $90 \%$ straight and further straightening produces only minimal forward drive, C) the heel of the front fool should land, and the front leg takes over the real propelling force again, pulling the body forward to the point that the knee is exactly over the ankle. Unless the knee is exactly in place, the recovery is seriously made inefilicient. It the knee is forward of the ankle, then weight is on the toes of the front foot, and the toe cannot be raised to effect the proper retreat without first shifling the body back; if the knee is behind the ankle, then bending the back leg to retreat will have the effect of dropping the body down instead of bringing it back, no matter how much the front toe is raised.
Needless to say, this shifting of emphasis

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from the front, to the back, and to the front leg again in extremely small fractions of a second takes a good deal of effort and training-without it, though, the fencer will always have to adopt a limiting forward lean to the "on guard," or will sulfer from what I call an "over the barrel," or "floating" lunge: call an over he barre, or loating lunge; the overall effect being that the fencer is
propelled up, rather than forward and must propelled up, rather than forward, and must
rely on gravity (which is amazingly slow compared to fencing speeds) to bring him or her back to earth to score the touch

Lets have more articles like Every's and Cook's; lets get some dialogue and genuine controversy and thinking going-keep up the good work
