Plus all of us who were there helping. It boggles the mind.

The competition ran beautifully, astonishingly so when you consider the numbers involved. The odds tell us that the more fencers we have the greater likelihood of delay caused by a twisted ankle or a bad body cord. You can't seed the next round until all the results are in. We were lucky.

There were twenty-two strips. It could not nave been run with less than twenty-two strips. And this fact creates a major problem.

You can put four or five strips in an average gymnasium. You can put eight to ten strips in a large hall. Where can you put twenty-two strips? Who can put on a Nationals?

There are a few fencers who urge that the only real purpose of the National Fencing Championships is to determine the ranking of the top fencers. However, most fencers feel that the Championships also serve as a convention of fencers and that fencers of all levels of skill from all over the country should be able to come and be a part of it. Most people do not feel a part of it unless they are involved. You are involved if you are competing, or directing, or sitting at the Bout Committee table, or coaching, or cheering for a team mate. Otherwise it is apt to be a bit lonesome.

There is another factor to consider also. There are a lot of expenses in connection with the National Championships. Some competitors and some officials have some or all of their way paid. There's rental and postage and costs for transporting borrowed equipment and on and on. The money to pay these costs comes from the entry fees. The host division should receive enough to not only pay the costs but to have a bit left over to buy a machine or two. If you cut down on the number of competitors you don't cut your costs appreciably but you do cut your income.

But - the Nationals cannot continue to grow because, if they do, we won't have the space or time to put them on.

Some urge that we change the rules so that fencers qualify from sectionals. This would mean that the sectionals become mini-nationals. Proponents urge that this is the reasonable way to handle the problem of size and that the result would strengthen the sections and maintain the convention spirit at the sectional level rather than the national level. Opponents point out the great diversity in size and strength of the sections, the problem at the sectional level of staging a major competition yearly and the financial problem of staging the Nationals with many fewer competitors.

There are others who feel that we should compromise by increasing the number of sectional qualifiers and reducing the number of divisional qualifiers.

Still others feel that the answer is to cut down on the number of divisional qualifiers with some adjustment for the stronger divisions.

There is also the question of teams. Almost everyone wants to keep the team competitions but it is a major problem when you have 41 teams in one weapon. Ordinarily it would be impossible to run any other competition at the same time.

Internationally, teams are composed of four fencers, not three. Every touch counts when there are four fencers. A team match with four team members takes a lot longer than a match with three. However, if you had twenty teams of four instead of forty teams of three you would require fewer strips. Many fencers who want teams of four point out that our present rules permit composite divisional teams. One of the advantages of team competition is that the less experienced fencers have an opportunity to fence with the more experienced. Teams of four would get an even greater encodurity. Others say no, lets keep our teams of three but cut down, if necessary, on the number of teams that qualify from each division. (Actually, this would make almost no difference.) They want to fence for their own club.

Another suggestion is to greatly increase the entry fee for teams.

The word DEVELOPMENT has become increasingly popular in AFLA correspondence, budgets, and discussions. Just what does it mean in fencing?

For many years, we have had a Junior Olympic Development Committee. This Committee is responsible for stimulating projects in local areas through advising and providing subsidies to Divisions who design, staff, and conduct appropriate activities that will further the development of fencing by introducing new fencers and coaches to the sport or improving their skills.

In 1977 the US Olympic Committee began to distribute unprecedented amounts of monies to the National Governing Bodies for the operation of qualified programs for sports development. The USOC Development Committee became a key manager of vilal portion of the USOC's activities.

In 1977, the AFLA inaugurated a long range Fencing Development Program, with projects for both elite athletes and promising youngsters as well as activities to attain a more cohesive American approach to teaching the fundamentals of fencing and to desseminate it to coaches and fencers throughout the country. The Program was designed to include sports medicine, officiating, and armorer training, as well as coaching and competitive aspects of the sport.


In 1978, the AFLA contracted for a Development Coordinator to prepare a long range plan for the growth and improvement of the sport in all essential ways. In reporting the results of this work in June 1979, our Coordinator recommended that we budget for and obtain someone to work for the AFLA to implement initial stages of the Development Plan.

At the June 1979 meeting of the AFLA Board of Directors, there was a proposal and discussion concerning the need for a renewed effort to develop officials through clinics, testing, and effective use in sig by Irwin Bernstein

What is DEVELOPMENT? It's all of the above!

If fencing is to grow and prosper, we must advance on all fronts. We have to improve the quality of our fencing at the elite level in order to enhance our public image by competitive success. We have to enhance the coaching skills of existing coaches and obtain many new ones in all parts of the country so that newcomers to the sport can be served properly from the start. We have to encourage our officials and armorers by helping them to advance technically as well as by recognizing their achievements and providing them with the opportunity to serve in meaningful ways. We have to broaden our base by bringing new people to the sport as competitors, as recreational fencers, as interested spectalors. We have to support local initiative in running clinics and other projects while also operating "top down" programs that reach out from national leaders to the grass roots. We have to utilize the USOC funds through appropriately conceived projects while also spending AFLA monies on additional undertakings. We have to obtain funds through sources within our sport as well as from previously untapped sources outside of fencina.

In order to achieve meaningful progress on a variety of objectives, we also have to stay together. We have to respect each other's pet projects. We have to be patient with priorities placed ahead of our own because of limitations on currently available finances. We have to maintain the perspective of the long haul. Whenever we become impatient over the progress we are making, we should look back at where we were. We have come a long way in a short time; let us resolve to work together to continue to advance in the future.

We will leave the question of our sanity to your better judgement and hope we served you well. See you all February 1, 2, and 3, 1980 at the Mile High Classic.


BOUT COMMITTEE by G. BAUMGART and S. CHERIS





In addition to holding the divisional championship, the West Virginia University Fencing Club provides demonstrations for area colleges, high schools, community groups, and T.V. programs.

Mary Jane Pearse may be considered the "mother of fencing" in the northern section of the State of West Virginia. Her enthusiasm for the sport of fencing has carried over to other colleges and high schools in the area. Fencing is now an important part of the Physical Education program at Victory, Parkersburg, and Huntington High Schools. Fencing is also taught at Marshall University and West Virginia Tech.

Mary Jane received her fencing instruction from Michigan State University and Master Santelli of New York. Mary Jane, we salute you for the dedication that you have given to the sport of fencing.







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1979 WESTERN WOMEN'S CLASSIC

For the second consecutive year, women fenced epee and sabre during the AFLA Nationals. The two yet-unofficial (for women) events were available through the 4th annual Western Women's Classic June 22nd and 23rd in the West Gym at the Air Force Academy. There were 60 entries in epee and 40 in sabre. Some women fenced both events.

Unlike last year's impromptu event at Hallendale, the Classic was publicized well in advance, and a large number preregistered. There was a wide variation in skill level among entrants. Some women have had consistant training, others very little, but the level of skill in both weapons has increased considerably over the past two years with more and more fencing masters accepting women as epee and sabre students, and increasing support from male clubmates who fence these weapons.

Placing in the top 24 in **both** weapons were: Marlene Adrian, Lynne Antonelli, Lois Goldthwaite, Elaine Ingram, Anne Klinger, Jane Littman and Jackie Sapulski. Elaine Ingram combined a 1st in sabre and 3rd in epee with her earlier 4th in foil for an impressive three-weapon achievement matched by none at Colorado Springs this year.

Next year the Western Women's Classic will move back to the West Coast, and plans are already underway for an Eastern Women's Classic to coincide with next year's Nationals in New York.

I am about to get a small gripe off my chest. I don't really know why I bother with it, but it bothers me, and since I've wondered about it for quite a while, here goes.

So far there's no regulation by the FIE about the matter, so people do pretty much what they want. What matter? Hooking up foil fencers to the reel wire. Incidentally, there has been one new detail added recently to the rules (in Article 217) that specifies where the crocodile clip has to be attached: "to the back of the metallic jacket on the side of the weapon arm." That's a step in the right direction, anyway. My guess is that by keeping it over on that side, they figure the fencer can't so easily do anything naughty — like brushing into it regularly with the trailing back arm and maybe, just accidentally of course, disconnecting it.

What I wonder about is the other aspect of the connection, namely, the attachment to the fencer of the socket-pouch (or whatever you call it) at the end of the reel wire. We do see a wide and entertaining variety of places for these things to be connected. The metal clip on the end of the thing (the one that's supposed to be there, I mean) gets attached to the pants (to a ring at the pocket level), to the buckle on the regular fencing jacket, to the buckle on the metallic jacket, to metal or plastic "D" or "O" rings attached to various places near the lower edge of the regular jacket, or on the side of the pants, or onto the metallic jacket. Those last kinds of connection - up on the metallic jacket - are the ones that bother me.

I know why some — maybe most fencers who favor that hook-up do it, of course. Look at someone doing it and you'll notice how even a not too well-fitting jacket gets pulled snugly back by the reel tension and thus the front target area is neatly smoothed out. That way, there's less chance or no chance for an opponent's point to snag a fold of cloth instead of just gliding by every so often. Most metallic jackets designed for this hookup have metal rings attached by loops of the same metallic cloth as the jacket



Dear Editor:

I can't tell you how pleased I was to read Paul Soter's letter in the May/June issue of American Fencing. For years I have been trying to make the same point, but Paul has said it much better than I.

"Cream without ... milk" — that's the problem! For years we have been bemoaning our international ineffectiveness. The response of our AFLA leadership has been to try to breed cows that give cream. Paul's solution is much more rational: get more milk — the cream comes with it!

Even in our Olympic Development Camp program (an excellent idea, well executed) we have the emphasis wrong. We run three days of coaches clinics, and a week of training for twenty promising young fencers. There is no doubt about the importance of the youngsters. However, twenty coaches would represent a hundred or more youngsters in the next ten years.

What can we do about the problem? How do we get more milk? Paul had some excellent suggestions, and perhaps I could add a few more:

1. Emphasis should be placed on the systematic development as soon as possible, of a national "school of fence"; that is, an official, approved, agreed-upon American technique for basic fencing. While this should be the responsibility of the NFCAA and the AAA, if they won't do the job the AFLA must.

2. The AFLA should sponsor regional camps and clinics to teach this "school" to the college and high school coaches and the club instructors, so that there can be a continuous progression in learning and training as the "cream" rises to the top. Motivation of fencers should be stressed at these camps. We need to introduce a lot of people to fencing, and to make the game enjoyable for them so that they'll stay at it. Once we have sufficient quantity, the quality problem will be easier to solve.

3. The AFLA national organization must encourage the local clubs and assist them in every way possible. Fencing is not done in the AFLA national offices, it's done in the clubs. Thus to promote fencing you must promote the clubs. The club directory in the May/June issue of American Fencing is a fine first step. Keep it up!

In conclusion, the polarization of the AFLA into the three groups Paul speaks of is inevitable. We have at least three jobs in the AFLA: to field an international squad, to develop new international competitors, and to serve as the national governing body for all of the amateur fencers in the country. All of the amateurs would like to see our international squad on top. The problem that we face is that we cannot expect to have more than an occasional, almost accidental success on the international level until we have been very successful on the local, grassroots level for many years ... "a generation." to use Paul's timetable. Why don't we get started? Sincerely. Milt Bank

Dear Madame:

Your exhortation to be a strip lawyer prompts me to bring up a misunderstanding wide-spread among epee fencers, regarding "bell touches." Many fencers think that the existence of a non-conducting area on the weapon is cause to annul any touch probably made by contact against that area. This is a reasonable rule for relaxed sparring in the salle, but is not the rule for competitions. Unfortunately, the rule book in this regard is not very well phrased.

Rule 327-g prohibits the annulment of touches against a dirty bell: "the fact that a fencer's epee displays...more or less extensive non-conductive areas ... does not provide a reason for annulment of touches signalled against that fencer." I have heard it objected that "more or less extensive is vague, and that the matter therefore lies within the discretion of the director. Fair enough; more or less does mean "to an undetermined degree." But extensive, while indefinite, always has the meaning of "more than a little," and the phrase in this case is the equivalent of those legislative stalwarts, "considerable" and "substantial." Now then.

the director, having eliminated all other causes for the "bell touch," must decide whether the non-conducting area is so small that it probably did not cause the touch to register, or is so extensive that it probably did cause the touch. In the first case there are no ipso facto grounds for annulment; in the second case annulment is prohibited by the rule. Thus, the meaning of rule 327-a is that "non-conductive areas of any extent whatsoever are not grounds for annulment." This is consistent with the principle that fencers are responsible for their equipment (rule 17. See, e.g., 327-f, which makes the fencer responsible, and vulnerable, should his body-cord become unplugaed).

This does not exhaust rule 327-g's potential for provoking disputes. In the case where an apparently clean, shiny bell is not conducting, should the director annul the touch because the bell does not "display" any corrosion that is visible, or should he interpret display more broadly as "evidence" and allow the touch?

Although many fencers, including experienced ones, believe that a dirty weapon is cause for a nulment of a touch made against it, I have found that those with international experience hold that it is not. It

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Before you read any further, you ought to understand that this story is a lie. Even if there had been a sabre bout like this, I couldn't have seen what I saw, and what I saw in the sabre match really has no bearing on why I can't fence sabre, anyway.

There's probably a lot of fencers out there about like me. Every couple of years, when the Nationals are held in my part of the country, I go for a reality check on my fencing level. Since I'm going anyway, I go to the divisional qualifying events in all weapons, and can usually fence in all three weapons at the Nationals if I want to. Getting out of the first round in maybe two out of the three weapons is normal, but that's about all the farther I go. Mostly I have a lot of free time to wander around and watch the real fencers.

Since I fence electric most of the time. sabre has always been hard for me, because not only do you have to hit, you also have to convince a bunch of other people that you have hit. Or maybe you just have to convince the side judges and the director that you have hit, without regard to whether or not you actually have hit. I always get confused about that in the middle of a sabre bout, and a little angry that nobody can see my hits. Of course, I rarely if ever practice sabre, but that doesn't have anything to do with why I can't fence sabre. I have gotten to the semi's of the sectionals in sabre, for heavens' sake. At least that's what I thought until I saw this one sabre bout that I mentioned at the beginning.

Let's say that this bout occurred in Portland during the sabre team event. Let's say that the fencers were Bill and Mike D. Maybe we'll call the director Jack, just so we can keep people straight. Of course this whole story is a lie, so you can disregard these false names and the false site.

To my eyes it looks like a dead even bout.


I thought about my own fencing, and remembered about a time when I had been taking lessons once a week, fencing three times a week, and hitting that golf ball whenever I had a spare moment. I remembered a tournament when I had great point control. I remembered the feeling that the epee had had. It was light, and seemed to move on its own to a closed position, from which I could not be hit. The blade pulled me in whenever the opponent was open, and it hit. That was the only time I got my soul out from behind the bell. I think it got out on the blade about one inch that day.

So the real reason I can't fence sabre is

that I can't coax my soul out on the sabre blade. Maybe if I practiced sabre? Maybe the secret is that you have to practice long enough to coax your soul from your body to your hand. And then more practice, tricking your soul from your fingers, out of your body proper onto the grip. Then, if your soul wants to win, and if your soul is good enough, it may flash down the blade when the opponent shows an opening, and strike the opponent, pulling your blade behind it.
