AMERICAN FENCING

PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL MESSAGE

During the past year the AFLA underwent some drastic changes. We changed from a local to a central billing system and we altered our dues structure. It was feared by many that these two changes would disrupt the League, and indeed there was some momentary confusion until the proper system was established. After that things ran more smoothly than before. There have been appreciably less complaints that the magazine and other mailings are getting misdirected and, despite some gloomy predictions, our membership is about the same size as the previous year - the dues increase notwithstanding. Some minor changes in the billing system this year will add to its efficiency.

The AFLA became incorporated during the year. There will be a number of procedural matters needed this year in order to transfer the affairs of the AFLA to the AFLA, Inc. and these will subsequently be spelled out to the League membership.

There is no need at this time to dwell on the splendid achievements of our fencers in the Pan American Games, but I would like to point out that under the auspices of the Olympic Fencing Committee a training camp was again held in the East and an Olympic development clinic in Milwaukee. Another clinic is scheduled for Ohio in August 1963 and plans are in progress for a California clinic in January 1964.

U. S. fencers competed in London, in the Criterium des Jeunes in Ghent, five U.S. fencers are going to Tokyo in October, and a number of our fencers are competing in the World Championships in Poland at the time of this writing. If we add the NYCA International Tourney and Canadian and Mexican competitions to this list, it is clear that we are quite active in international fencing. It should be pointed out that none of the activities noted above was financed by the AFLA. In addition, there was U.S. participation in a considerable number of military and pentathlon international events. For the first time the U.S. won the CISM fencing championship.

AMERICAN FENCING

In the season now beginning there are four major areas in which we must concentrate. First, the 1964 Olympics, with all the necessary training, tryouts and selections, will demand effort from many people - not merely the candidates and the selection committee. Secondly, the publication of a new rules book (and the antecedent revision of our rules, constitution and by-laws that should be done before the book is published) will require careful committee work and probably special meetings of the League and the Board of Governors. Thirdly, the assumption of the offices of Secretary and Foreign Secretary by new men will undoubtedly produce changes that will need cooperation from divisional officers and many others. Mr. Orsi has indicated plans that will undoubtedly benefit the AFLA if he is given all possible assist-

Lastly, I must speak of a matter in which I am personally concerned. The AFLA has just gone through its first contested Presidental election in a great many years. Naturally I am pleased and proud to have won. I am also proud that neither of the candidates, Jack Baker or myself, indulged in a "mud slinging" campaign. In the heat of political struggle, however, there did occur "mud slinging" and personal antagonisms. I for my part will bear no malice, and ask all good AFLA members to adopt the same attitude. We cannot afford to have the election disagreement perpetuated into a lasting schism. Both sides included good, hard working, valuable men and women who love fencing, and they must not be lost to the League. Both on a local and a national level we must all pledge ourselves to see that two parties do not develop. We all have the same goal and we are all working hard for it. Even if there are disagreements on methods and on minor details we must believe in each other's good will and good intent. In my mind the most important task at this moment is to forget and efface any hostility that the last few months have engendered.

OLYMPIC COMMITTEE

The Fencina Games Committee met in s Angeles on July 6, 1963.

It was decided that there would be no ecial qualifying event held in the Southest section. Fencers from that area will : permitted to enter the Pacific Coast, idwest or Eastern events. This decision was ade because now that the Pentathlon group) longer belongs to the Southwest section, e strength there does not compare satisictorily with that of the other three. The ommittee considered carefully the problem how a strong fencer in a weak section ight have an opportunity to earn the maxium number of points. It voted to permit I fencers to enter any one of the three rst regional qualifying events scheduled for inuary 1964.

The second qualifying events, scheduled or March or April, will be the following:

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Pacific Coast Championships, Midwest Championships, East Coast tryout. Only members of the section may compete in the first two mentioned, but the East Coast event is open to all fencers, and any member of the Pacific Coast or Midwest who wishes to have the East Coast event (rather than his sectional) count as his qualifying event for Olympic points, may do so by informing the Olympic Committee before any of these events is held.


With regard to illness or injury preventing a fencer from competing in one of the events, the Committee decided as follows: no one will be excused from the 1964 National Championships; of the three earlier qualifying events, the Committee will consider in all cases — the two best results.

No one will be excused from the qualifying events except in the following cases: Recognizing that civilian citizens living outside the contiguous 48 states cannot be expected to attend the four qualifying events, it was decided that such fencers would be judged solely on the basis of their showing in the 1964 Nationals. If they make the finals they will be permitted to fence in The Olympic Tryout at the World's Fair, along with those fencers selected on the basis of cumulative points. In the final selection of the Team, these "extra" fencers will have their results considered on a prorata basis, while the others will be on an absolute number of points earned.

No change was made in the point weighting system reported in the May 1963 issue of American Fencing.

Since no mathematical point system is infallible if caried to extreme, two or more competitors will be considered TIED for team selection (or for the Olympic Tryout in July) if the difference in their point scores is LESS than the aggregate time and strength factors involved in the difference of one place in the qualifying events. This is the same definition of a "tie" as used by prior Olympic Committees.

Entry fees of \$3.00 will be charged for the one Pacific Coast, one Midwest and two Eastern qualifying events to be held under the auspices of the Fencing Games Commit-

Amendments to By-Laws

The following amendments were passed:

Chapter III, Section 3: next to last sentence, second clause, change "March" to "April".

Chapter III, Section 4: first sentence, change "April" to "May".

Chapter III, Section 7; add two new sentences at the end, to read "Proxy votes on amendments to the Constitution or By-Laws are not valid unless the proxy statement contains a written declaration of whether it is to be voted for or against said amendments. It may of course be voted only in the way so designated."

Chapter V, Section 2: first sentence, change "April" to "May".


Chapter V, Section 3: change "April" to "May".

New Chapter XI: Rules of Order — The Rules contained in Robert's Rules of Order Revised (75th Anniversary Edition) shall govern the League in all cases to which they are applicable, and in which they are not inconsistant with the Constitution, By-Laws or the special rules of order of the League. The normal form of debate during meetings will be informal consideration."

"Tony" has been an active member of the AFLA since 1937. Prior to 1940 he won the Hammond Foil and several foil and sabre events in New York and New Jersey. His pride at that time was placing second to Dr. Bukantz, with Dean Cetrulo third.

He turned professional in 1940 as assistant to George Santelli and later taught at Dartmouth and Middlebury. War cut short his professional career. After the War he worked in the engineering department at Curtis Wright Aeronautical and resumed his interest in amateur fencing. The Board reinstated him to amateur status in 1946. Since then he has helped to organize many new clubs and to promote the sport in various schools in New Jersey.

He served as chairman of the N. J. Division for several years and has been active in the growth of the Jr. Olympic program both in the State and in the North Atlantic section. He has been on the Board of Governors several years and is determined to improve communications with the Divisions.

He is a successful contractor and builder.

NORMAN LEWIS Foreign Secretary

"Normie" is one of our great Champions and Olympic fencers. He was a finalist in the 1948 Olympic Epee Championship and won the National Epee Championship for three consecutive years (1948, 49, 50), a feat duplicated only once in our history and that by Tatham back in 1901-02-03. He was also selected for the 1952 Olympic Team but was unable to go because of business. He was National Foil Champion in 1939 and runner-up in 1940.

He is a product of N. Y. high school fencing (PSAL) and was developed at N.Y.U. by Julio Castello and later at the Salle Santelli by George Santelli. While at college he was inter-collegiate champion and varsity captain, and in open competition won several Metropolitan titles in foil and epee. He served on the Board of Governors several years.

He is fluent in French and has a charming wife who is multi-lingual. He is a CPA and a successful business executive.

A FENCING HALL OF FAME

The Helms Hall of Los Angeles has instituted a Fencing Hall of Fame at the request of the National Fencing Coaches Association, which submitted the following for initial induction:

NORMAN C. ARMITAGE. The greatest sabre champion of the U.S. Ten times National Sabre Champion, winner of 22 National individual medals. On US Olympic Teams of 1928, 1932, 1936, 1948, 1952, 1956.

GEORGE C. CALNAN. Member of U.S. Olympic Teams of 1928, 1932. Placed 3rd in 1928 Olympic Epee Championship. National Foil Champion 6 times and Epee Champion once in a career cut short by the Akron dirigible disaster in 1933.

JULIO M. CASTELLO. Coach of NYAC, 1914-1924, Olympic Team coach, 1924, New York University coach, 1927-1947. Born in Spain, trained at the Royal Academy.

CLOVIS F. J. DELADRIER. Coach of U.S. Naval Academy, 1927-1948. Past president of National Fencing Coaches Association. National Champion of Belgium in foil and epee in 1926.

ROBERT GRASSON. Coach of Yale University, 1920-1956, Olympic Team coach, 1936. One of the founders of National Fencing Coaches Association. Born in Belgium.

SHERMAN HALL. America's foremost fencer from 1910 to 1920. National Foil Champion 4 times, medalist 4 times. Sabre Champion 3 times, medalist 3 times. Three-Weapon Champion 4 times, medalist twice.

GRAEME M. HAMMOND. Founding President of the Amateur Fencers League of America in 1891, serving through 1925. Captain of 1912 Olympic Team. National Epee Champion in 1893, Sabre Champion in 1893 and 1894.

JOHN R. HUFFMAN. President of the Amateur Fencers League of America, 1940-1943. National Sabre Champion 5 times, medalist 6 times. National foil medalist 4 times. Member of 1932 and 1936 Olympic Teams.

JOSEPH L. LEVIS. Member of 1928, 1932 and 1936 Olympic Teams, Captain in 1936. Placed 2nd in 1932 Olympic Foil Championship. National Foil Champion 6 times, medalist 4 times.

HELENE MAYER. Greatest woman fencer of all time. National Champion 8 times, runner-up once. Representing Germany, was Olympic Champion in 1928 and second in 1936. Was European Champion in 1929 and 1931, World Champion in 1937.

JAMES MURRAY. Coach of New York A.C. for 60 years and Columbia University for 55 years. Developed many champions, is one of the U.S.'s most illustrious fencing coaches.

LEO G. NUNES. Greatest National Champion. Epee Champion 6 times, Sabre Champion 3 times and medalist 5 times, Foil Champion once and medalist 5 times. Competed for 45 years, is still active at the New York A.C.

W. SCOTT O'CONNOR. One of founding fathers of the A.F.L.A., served as its first Secretary for 35 years. National Foil Champion 1892, Epee Champion 1905. Member of 1904 Olympic Team.

J. BROOKS B. PARKER. Member of the International Olympic Committee and U.S. Olympic Committee. Generous donor to fencing National sabre medalist twice. Member of 1920 and 1924 Olympic Teams.

J. SANFORD SALTUS. Early patron of fencing in the U.S. Active in YMCA development. Donor of several trophies, including one for U.S. Masters Epee Tournament.

GEORGE SANTELLI. One of U.S.A.'s greatest fencing masters instrumental in popularizing fencing for the masses. Coach of many Olympic Teams, his Salle's colors have been worn by many great U.S. fencers. Son of Italo Santelli.

MARIA CERRA TISHMAN. Member of 1948 Olympic Team, tied for 2nd in the Championship but dropped to 4th on touches. National Champion in 1934, medalist 4 times.

MARION LLOLYD VINCE. National Champion twice, medalist 8 times. On 1928, 1932 and 1936 Olympic Teams. A successful coach in Los Angeles with her noted husband Joseph Vince, also a former National Champion.

The early posting of pools and the double sets of reels on each strip for all electrical events were major factors in completing the events at a reasonable hour. The Bout Committee believes both teachniques should be made mandatory for future Nationals.

The Nationals were very well organized—a fact that we have come to expect from Southern California and its Chairman, Fred Linkmeyer. We would be derelict if we did not thank the many individuals whose help was invaluable. Special mention is due to Ned Drago who did a superb job as Chairman of the Electrical Committee, and to Warren Dow whose love of fencing brought him to Los Angeles at his own expense and who worked twelve to fourteen hours each day to keep the events running smoothly.

Ed Richards of New England and the NYAC was undefeated in retaining the foil title. Ed thus has the enviable record of being undefeated in the event two consecutive years. Fencing historians might well review the records to determine whether this stupendous performance has been achieved previously.

Albert Axelrod lost only to Richards, 5-4. A surprising third went to the versatile Mike Dasaro and undoubtedly his superb physical condition was a major factor in his achievement. Robert Russell of Salle Santelli gained a well deserved fourth place. Although his excellent technique has been effective only sporadically in the past, increased confidence should make his future performances more consistent.

Three members of the Pan American Team (Anastasi, Davis, Zombolas) were eliminated prior to the final, as were last year's ranking fencers Glazer, Goldsmith and Grafton. It is increasingly apparent that consistency of result is no longer a general attribute of foil fencing. Whether this is due to greater strength among more fencers, or a general reduction in proficiency remains an open question.



CLASSIC, OR NOT CLASSIC

This article is not meant to argue with Mr. Csiszar ("Fencing is Not Ballet", May issue of American Fencing), it is merely a difference of opinion.

We know fencing is not ballet, but according to the science of human motion we also know that fencing and ballet are closely related. The classical form is certainly not the "magic formula" for becoming a successful competitor or even a good fencer, but it is the basic element. It is an imperative component for a young fencer, especially if he also has good competitive temperament. Many great prospects, talented intermediate fencers, lose the desire to continue fencing because they lack the classical form and fundamentals and find they don't have the tools to progress further.

If somebody would make a study of why the majority of the fencers are not successful year after year in the NCAA or the National Championships, he would find the following factors: (1) lack of classical fundamentals, (2) poor competitive attitude, (3) poor coordination, (4) weak technique, (5) poor tactics, etc. The NCAA Championships are a mighty demonstration of the growing American fencing, yet it is obvious even to a layman that while many fencers have areatly different form and style, as many have no form or no style at all. The statistics indicate a very large percentage of the NCAA participants will not improve their fencina and will not continue the sport. Why? Because they are lacking the classical fundamentals. We in the U.S. are not united in purpose. Almost every coach has a different idea as to teaching method, technique, form and style. This is not so with the French, Hungarians, Italians, Poles or Russians. It is one of the factors contributing to the weakness of American fencing. In this state of confusion we have only one positive fact—the classic form—if somebody can teach it.

Classic form is not static. It has progressed generation after generation with the aid of great methods teachers, and sequence by

sequence in the past decades. It has lost its stiffness and become very mobile. The great international fencers today are classic in their lessons, and add their own cadence to it in combat. This is fine. They are classic and modern. No one of them was brought up to the international level with sloppy form and style.

Why must we teach the classical form? Because it is the only form (or position) which is favorable to the beginner. Take the "on Guard", which is the activity position in fencing. If the position is classic and correct, it will be much easier for the beginner to initiate a movement; it is easier for the teacher to coordinate the hand and lea motions of the pupil. If the guard position is not correct, the student will have difficulties in moving smoothly — and coordination will be more difficult. If he doesn't coordinate well, he will be unable to perform a compound action properly. The result is sloppiness, the teacher will have an unpleasant time and may even be unable to correct his pupil's faults, and, usually, a tragic thing will happen; the student will lose faith in his

Conclusion: in the past, many funny suggestions have appeared in these pages. Somebody suggested a Swedish type stiffening calysthenics, another favored skiing for the fencer. Next we will probably see underwater swimming and mountain climbing recommended. It seems everyone involved in fencing is searching for a way out of the hazy depths of American fencing. This is fine, but a snobish suggestion has no value — it is in fact harmful. The classic idea is with us and will remain with us in any modern evaluation.
