

### FIE Paris Congress Awards Meet to AFLA; Martini & Rossi to be Held Following Week

#### FIE CONGRESS REPORT by Norman Lewis

The annual Congress of the Federation Internationale D'Escrime held in Paris on May 7th and 8th, has awarded to the Amateur Fencers League of America the holding of the World Junior Championships for 1971. The Championships will be held from April 8th to the 12th at the brand new Athletic and Convocation Center of the University of Notre Dame, in South Bend, Indiana. The 8.6 million dollar Center covers over 10 acres, all under one roof. The overall dimensions of the building are 630 by 750 feet and the height of each of the two domes is 75 feet. The Center is fully equipped for all sports including a six lane green Tartan indoor running track, several tennis courts, and an ice skating rink. Twelve hundred permanent seats can be increased to 4300 upon demand.

Making the successful bid for the United States were AFLA delegates Miguel A. deCapriles and Norman Lewis.

For fencers and officials there is the Morris Inn just adjacent to the fencing site for housing and subsistence. The cost for the housing will be \$5.00 per person at three to a room. Meals will be an additional \$3.00 per day

The AFLA will be obligated to pay for the fare and housing of six FIE officials from Europe and one (M. Carl Schwende) from Canada. The FIE will supply two Class 3 Directors and the AFLA will have to furnish all other required officials.

The particular scheduling of these World Junior Championships will enable many of the top international stars to remain here in the United States and participate in next year's Martini and Rossi Challenge, which will be held in New York on April 16, 17, and 18. Thus it is hoped that U. S. fencers will get a great opportunity for top competition.

During the Congress there were numerous other regulatory changes enacted with respect to the seeding of individuals and teams in official fencing events. The compulsory use of the new flat point in foil will become effective January 1, 1972. The full text of these changes will be published in AMERI-CAN FENCING as soon as the AFLA has adopted them.

The United States was awarded two new Class 2 FIE directors, Dr. Marius Valsamis and Richard Gradkowski. Applicants for examination as internationally accredited directors must receive written approval from the AFLA before taking the FIE examination. No professionals will be accepted as FIE Class 2 or 3 directors.

The 1971 World Fencing Championships will be held in Vienna, Austria, from July 4th to July 17th. Our own U.S. Nationals will have to be appropriately scheduled to avoid the possibility of conflict.

The two day Congress of the FIE was held at the Automobile Club, Place dela Concorde, with a closing formal dinner at the George V Hotel.



Gyozo Kulscar of Hungary (left) neatly evades an attack to the foot by Steve Netburn, during the Epee event of the Martini-Rossi International.




### ESTABLISHMENT OF NATIONAL FENCING CENTERS

The United States Olympic Fencing Sport Committee has designated Dr. Paul Todd Makler, former President of the AFLA, to spearhead a task force of representatives of the AAHPER, NFCAA and AFLA whose mission is to establish at one or more colleges or universities permanent facilities and programs for the training of students majoring in physical education in the art of fencing as a part of the formal curriculum. A secondary goal is to arrange for these institutions to be designated as Olympic Fencing Development Centers whereat major competitions and special events such as summer training camps might be held. If successful not only students but practicing physical education teachers and athletic coaches would be eligible to participate in an expanded pro-

By increasing the availability of secondary school teachers equipped to teach and coach fencing at least at the basic skills level we will have created one of the necessary conditions for broadening participation in our sport.

The final qualifying competition for the World University Games team was held April 25 and 26 at the new Athletic and Convocation Center on the campus of the University of Notre Dame, South Bend, Indiana. Fifty seven candidates competed and the following were selected to represent the United States.

The Collegiate Sports Council calculates that the expenses of the trip, transportation to and from New York, room and board at the Games, etc., figures to be \$425.00 per person. In view of the fact that the Collegiate Sports Council has only approved four competitors in each weapon, we will have to ask the Collegiate Sports Council for permission to take the fifth person. In view of the fact that the fifth competitor in each event would have to pay his or her way totally and may not be used during the competition, it is the feeling of the committee that the fifth person should not be selected unless he or she fully understands that he or she would have to fully undertake the expenses of this trip with the distinct possibility of not being used in the competition.

The World University Games will be held in Torino, Italy, from August 26 to September 6, 1970.

gram at all, including football, basketball and baseball.

The ordinary college student on campus is already discriminated against because the sports of football, basketball, baseball and hockey, swimming and track are not available to him due to the fact that he, in high school, was not allegedly a high school All-American champion, etc. in that particular sport. These so-called money-making sports are justified only if they support a total athletic program whereby the ordinary everyday student, male or female, can partake in some other sport whether or not they were high school champions or whether or not they even participated on a high school team. One of the few sports today that fulfills this need on campus is Fencing. This sport today, as a rule, is introduced to the student when he or she enrolls in college. The student's interest is ignited perhaps out of curiosity or out of sincere desire to participate in a sport in which he can represent his University in contests against other Universities. Many of these students never participated in athletics in this fashion. On the other hand many of them did participate in high school but, of course, did not achieve the level expertise qualifying them for an athletic scholarship for one of the moneymaking sports. These students and all others I say again should not be discriminated

The University which fails to fully support and finance so-called minor sports, such as Fencing, in their athletic programs, I predict will be subject to student unrest and dissent. We have had enough of this so-called non-violence revolt. I believe it is far better if the University Administration and Athletic Directors recognize the problem before it gets out of hand and thereby undertake preventive measures rather than remedial measures. By doing this, perhaps the people in athletics will avoid the hardships and griefs that arise out of civil disorder.

It is the duty and responsibility of all of us in Fencing to bring this matter to the attention of all the high school and college administrators and help them in establishing Fencing and other "So-called" minor sports in their athletic programs.

Paladin of TV fame had nothing on James Melcher of the New York Fencers Club. Posing as a mild mannered stockbroker during the week, Jamie regularly packs up his epees on weekends and is off for Europe to skewer some unsuspecting opponent. Naturally, instead of a stagecoach, he uses TWA.

In recent months, Jamie has competed in the Monal Challenge in Paris, the Huy International in Belgium, the London Martini, the Spreafico in Milan, the Heidenheim in Germany, and the Poitiers in France.

In the London Martini, he and Steve Netburn scored a double coup, taking third and second, respectively. (See our last issue of AMERICAN FENCING for the complete story.) Recently he placed eighth in the tough Poitiers meet and in the Heidenheim Epee he made the top 64 out of a huge field of over 300 entries.


A six foot tall, lanky, left hander, Jamie began fencing at Columbia University in his junior year. Upon graduation, he joined the New York Fencers Club and began studying with Michel Alaux, U. S. Olympic Coach. In 1963, Jamie made the Pan American team that competed in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

In his capacity as a broker, Jamie is a director of a small but growing airline, Air Indies, which flies DeHavilland Twin Otters between Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands. This enables him to get an inside track on the advantages of air travel.

Jamie cited three interacting factors which he felt contributed to his success. First was his reliance upon the training for international level competition which Maitre Alaux has been giving him over the years. This was most evident to him in his bouts against some of the top European fencers, where he found that he could use certain actions almost as if he were taking a lesson, Second, he was able to take the time to be in Europe for some days prior to competing, so that he could acclimate to the time schedule change. Third, he adopted an attitude of relaxation about the competitions and fenced each bout as it was called—the result of sufficient past exposure to international conditions.

Jamie is married to Barbara and is the proud father of Charlie, 5 and Elizabeth, 2. Charlie has already been up to the Fencers Club and is receiving pointers from Maitre Alaux





a recent addition to the Lighty training program. John A. ng master and mobility instrucjned this unique course to help on trainee develop self-reliance, rdination, good reflexes, motor mental and emotional control.

The Lighthouse goal is not to develop blind fencers, but to use fencing to develop the remaining senses as part of the trainee's orientation and mobility training, in which he learns how to travel independently and is aware at all times of his immediate environment. Maestro Rocsin states; "The aim of using fencing as a tool for teaching blind persons is not to develop fencers, but rather to use special fencing techniques in order to develop the senses of the clients". Nevertheless, he is working on applying fencing as a competitive sport for the blind and in the future hopes to see such a system perfected.

Fencing was instituted at the Lighthouse last summer for twenty one blind and visually impaired teenagers who participated in a special four weeks personal adjustment program. The summer program proved a success and fencing has now become an integral part of the sensory training program. Eight classes a week are taught.

Maestro Rocsin is originally from Oradea,

Romania, and came to the United States in 1963. He was selected a member of the Romanian fencing team for the 1952 Olympics in Helsinki, and he also fenced in the Romanian Army. He is currently Varsity fencing coach of the Cooper Union Institute of Art and Science and is an accredited NFCAA Fencing Master.

The orientation and mobility program of the Lighthouse works with both congenitally and adventitiously blinded individuals of all ages and additional handicaps who wish to gain independence through professional instruction.

Orientation is defined as the process by which an individual forms an association between himself and objects within an environment. He learns to form a continuous mental map of his environment in terms of a general reference system such as compass points.

An individual who is oriented should, at any given instant, be able to answer the questions: "Where am !?", "In what direction am I facing?", "In what direction have I moved?". Only after he is oriented and able to form a mental map of his environment, can he be taught mobility skills.


Mobility is the process of moving from place to place within an environment. Protection and ease of movement is provided through the use of a particular mobility device, such as a prescription cane, guide dog, electronic device, or human guide.

Ideally, the well designed program grants the handicapped person a safe and efficient means of travel, a confidence and comfort with himself and his skills, and an ease and rapport with his environment. Fencing has been found to be excellent training for this type of program. The classical French school movements of "double-change of engagement" and the "doigte" resulting in "sentiment du fer", combined with the practice of basic positions and footwork fit well into the requirements of the work of rehabilitation.


