Q vick Facts

Founded: The USFA was founded in 1891 in New York City as the Amateur Fencers League of America.

National Office: The USFA headquarters are located at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. The office opened in 1982 with one full-time staff member. The staff has grown to seven full-time employees.

Membership: Nearly 9,200 fencers belong to the USFA (as of March, 1993). However, the USFA estimates that there are approximately 150-200,000 recreational fencers in the United States.

Events: The USFA sanctions 6,000 events each season. Twenty-two are conducted at the annual Junior Olympic Fencing Championships in Feb. and at the National Championships in June.


World Championships: Individual and team World Championships are held every year except Olympic years. Individual World Under-17 and Under-20 Championships are held every year.

A Sport For All Ages: Fencers at the 1992 National Championships ranged in age from 10 to 67. Fencing is a sport anyone can start at any age.

An Expensive Sport? It is a myth that fencing is an expensive sport. A starter kit costs \$125-\$150. Compare that to cycling, skiing or shooting for a few. Once a fencer makes it to the international level, however, the cost goes up—a complete regulation uniform and weapons will cost about \$1,000.

Clubs: Fencing clubs are located throughout the United States. In addition, you can find fencers in all 50 states. The National Office can provide directories of clubs by state or by major metropolitan area.

A bout The USFA

The United States Fencing Association (USFA) was founded in 1891 as the Amateur Fencers League of America (AFLA) by a group of New York fencers seeking independence from the Amateur Athletic Union. The AFLA changed its name to the United States Fencing Association in 1981.

The Amateur Sports Act specifically named the United States Olympic Committee (USOC) as the coordinating body for amateur athletic activity in the U.S. directly relating

to international Olympicathleticcompetition. The Act included provisions for recognizing National Governing Bodies

(NGBs) for the sports on the Olympic and Pan American Games programs.

The USFA is the recognized National Governing Body (NGB) for the sport of fencing in the United States. The USFA is affiliated with the Federation Internationale d'Escrime, the international federation for fencing founded in Paris in 1913. In 1960 the United States' Dr. Miguel A. de Capriles became the first non-European president of the FIE. Currently, USFA National Director Chaba Pallaghy is serving as a Vice President for the 1993-96 quadrennium.

The USFA was incorporated as a non-profit corporation in Pennsyl-

vania in 1964 in compliance with the Amateur Sports Act and opened its national office at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colo. in Aug. of 1982. Carla-Mae Richards was hired as the USFA's first full-time Executive Director in 1983 and continues to serve in that capacity.

A Strategic Planning Commission met in 1992 to charter a course for the USFA's future. The Commission defined the association's mission, which is to: direct, administer and promote the sport in the U.S.; de-

> velop programs that increase participation and encourage physical fitness and sportsmanship; sanction local, regional and na-

tional tournaments; develop programs to raise the skill levels of athletes, coaches and officials; select athletes and cadre for international competition; develop programs to achieve world class results; and develop initiatives to advance the sport's Olympic status.

In keeping with its mission, the USFA sends teams to the World Championships, the World Under-20 Championships, and the World Under-17 Championships. In addition, the USFA develops programs to assist its top athletes towards achieving international results.

The USFA selects teams to represent the USA at the Olympic Games,

Pan American Games, World University Games and U.S. Olympic Festival.

The U.S. has hosted two World Championships (1958 in Philadelphia and 1989 in Denver) as well as three World Under-20 Championships at Notre Dame University (1971, '79, '88). For the first time in their five-year history, the World Under-17 Championships will be held on U.S. soil this April in Denver. In another first, it will be held concurrently with the World Under-20 Championships, the fourth to be hosted by the U.S.

Domestically, USFA programs range from grassroots to coaching education.

USFA grassroots success in attracting young people is evident at the annual Junior Olympic Fencing Championships (JOs). The 1993 JOs drew the largest numbers yet – records were set in the number of competitors (925) and in the number of entries (1,491 in 22 events). The event started in 1971 with 100 fencers in four events

The tournament, which is always held over Presidents' Day Weekend in Feb., crowns champions in the Under-20, Under-17 and Under-15 categories while demonstration events are held in the Under-13 and Under-11 age groups. More than 6,000 bouts were fenced in 1993.

The USFA conducts the annual Coaches College in August at the Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs. The Coaches College began in 1983 as part of the USFA's coaching development program and has become the most prestigious fencing coaches seminar in the United States. Coach participants in this program have benefitted from the expertise of some of the world's best instructors.

U SFA Leadership

Steve Sobel President



Steve Sobel is no stranger to the position of USFA President. He held that office from 1972-76. Sobel contributes an objectivity to the issues of fencing as an amateur sport in these changing times.

He has earned the respect and esteem of the U.S. Olympic Committee, having served as Secretary (1981-85) and Vice President (1995-89).

He was Chief of Mission for the 1987 Pan American Games Team and has been a lecturer at the Interna-

tional Olympic Academy.

Sobel has chaired the USOC's Membership Committee since 1989 and has been a member of that committee since 1984.

He is a U.S. representative to the Pan American Sports Organization. Sobel understands the athletes' concerns, having been the 1954 NCAA Sabre Champion and All-American while at Columbia College (1954). He was a member of the 1959 World Championships team.

He graduated from Columbia Law School in 1956, where Sobel was Editor of the Columbia Law Review.

Professionally, Sobel, of Cedar Grove, N.J., is Director of Paralegal Studies at Long Island University, a position he has held since 1988.

William Goering Vice President



William (Bill) Goering's retirement from Ford Motor Company in 1991 has given him the opportunity to spend more time furthering the cause of his favorite sport.

Currently, he is Vice President concentrating on national affairs and chairs the Stategic Planning Commission.

He was USFA Executive Vice President from 1972-80, an at large member of the Executive Committee in four

administrations from 1980-92 and chair of the USFA Fencing Officials Commission from 1980-84. Goering lives in Rochester, Mich.

Stacey Johnson Vice President



Stacey Johnson, a member of the 1980 Olympic Fencing Team, is an instructor of Mass Communications at Palo Alto

College and a communications consultant in San Antonio, Texas. She was named Express/News Outstanding Woman and J.C. Penney's Spirit of the American Woman awards in 1992.

As Vice President, Johnson is responsible for the international competitive arena and marketing initiatives.

She is also a member of the Executive Committee of the San Antonio Sports Foundation and the San Antonio Local Organizing Committee for U.S. Olympic Festival-'93.

Michael Marx Vice President



Four-time Olympian Michael Marx will focus on coach and cadre development in his role as Vice President.

Marx was the

youngest fencer ever to win the Division I National Championship in men's foil at 17. He holds a record seven National Championships in that discipline and earned the distinguished title of Fencing Master in Poland in 1992.

Marx coaches at Escrime du Lac and the Indiana Fencing Academy in Mishawaka, Ind.

Ann Ezzell Secretary



Ann Ezzell of Bloomfield Hills, Mich., has been a member of the Board of Directors since 1989 and has edited and trans-

lated the USFA Rules Book since

Ezzell was the manager for the 1989 & '90 World Championships and '91 World University Games teams.

She has been an internationallyranked President of Jury in epee since 1989.

Jennings Smith Treasurer



Jennings Smith of Oakland, Calif. has been a recreational fencer for 25 years. He has served as the Treasurer for the Northern California

Division and is a Certified Public Accountant.

Smith has held positions with Price Waterhouse, the U.S. General Accounting Office for San Francisco and the U.S. Army Audit Agency. He was Director of Finance for the City of Oakland.

Carla-Mae Richards Executive Director



Carla-Mae Richards has been at the helm of the U.S. Fencing Association as Executive Director since that position was established in 1983. During her tenure, the USFA has expanded in membership numbers and in programs offered.

She has broadened the communications base for the USFA's elite athletes with the USFA Point Newsletter and for the membership in general with the quarterly USFA National Newsletter.

Richards has had a direct hand in the expansion of national junior team programs, which includes the Youth, Cadet and Junior North American Circuit Tournaments. While many of our current elite athletes probably began fencing during their teenage years, our future elite are starting in the sport much earlier as a result of this USFA grassroots program.

The office staff has expanded from two to seven full-time employees, assuming many of the responsibilities formerly performed by volunteers.

Before becoming Executive Director, Richards co-owned and operated the Academy of Fencing and Salle d'Armes Richards for 10 years in Watertown, Mass. She handled both the business and scheduling responsibilities at the clubs.

She began in the sport as a competitive fencer and went on to coach fencing at the high school level.

Richards, a 20-year USFA volunteer before becoming Executive Director, earned her B.A. in Psychology from Brandeis ('58), where she was a member of the varsity fencing team.

Chaba Pallaghy FIE Vice President, USFA National Director



USFA National Director Chaba Pallaghy became the first American since 1960 to hold an office in the Federation Internationale d'Escrime when he was elected a vice president in January, 1993.

Pallaghy brings diplomacy as well as a command of six languages to his new post. He has been a member of the FIE Executive Committee for four consecutive quadrennials.

A native of Hungary, Pallaghy emigrated to the United States in 1957, during the revolution in that country. Once in the U.S., Pallaghy continued to fence, and eventually won a gold medal as a member of the 1963 Pan American Games champion sabre team. His fencing career ended a year later when he tore his Achilles' tendon in an Olympic team tryout.

Pallaghy went on to excel as an official. He has directed at the Pan American Games ('67, '75, '79) as well as the Olympic Games ('72, '76). He directed two finals at the '72 Olympic Games in Munich, Germany.

He has also served on the bout committee for various Pan Am Games and world championships, and was elected a vice-president of the Pan American Fencing Federation in 1979.

he Sport

The sport of fencing is fast and athletic, a far cry from the choreographed bouts you see on film or on the stage. Instead of swinging from a chandelier or leaping from balconies. you will see two fencers performing an intense dance on a six feet by 40 feet strip. The movement is so fast the touches are scored electrically. It is more like Star Wars than Captain Blood.

The Weapons

Foil, Epee and Sabre are the three weapons used in the sport of fencing. While it is not unusual for fencers to compete in all three events, they generally choose to develop their skills in one weapon. Until recently, women were permitted to compete only in foil, but now the USFA offers national competitions for women in epee and sabre. Women's epee was added to the World Championships in 1989 and is a Pan American event.

Foil and epee are point thrusting weapons. Sabre is a point thrusting as well as a cutting weapon. The target areas differ for the three weapons and all three are electrical (for scoring purposes).

Object

The main object of a fencing bout (what an individual "game" is called) is to effectively score five touches on your opponent before he/she scores five touches on you. Each time a foncer scores a touch, he/she receives

a point. The first fencer to achieve five points wins the bout. In direct elimination matches a fencer must defeat his/her opponent two out of three, five-touch bouts. (The system is similar to tennis.) There is a 30 second rest break between each bout in a match.

Foil

The foil, the modern version of the dueling rapier, has a flexible rectangular blade, approximately 35 inches in length, weighing

less than one pound. Touches are scored with the point of the blade and must land within the torso of the body.

The valid target area in foil is the torso, from the shoulder to the groin and the back. It does not include the arms, neck, head and legs. The foil fencer's uniform includes a metallic vest (called a lame) which covers the

valid target area, so that a valid touch will register on the scoring machine. A small, spring-loaded tip is attached to the point of the foil and is connected to a wire inside the blade. The fencer wears a body cord inside his uniform which connects the foil to a reel wire, connected to the scoring machine.

There are two scoring lights on the machine. One shows a green light when a fencer is hit, and one shows a red light when his/her opponent is hit. Atouch landing outside the valid target area (that which is not covered by the lame) is indicated by a white light. These "off target" hits do not count in the scoring, but they do stop the fencing action.

Epee

The Epee (pronounced "EPP-pay"), the descendant of the dueling sword. is similar in length to the foil, but is heavier, weighing approximately 27 oz., with a larger guard (to protect

the hand from a valid hit) and a much stiffer blade. Touches are scored only with the point of the blade and the entire body is the valid target area.

The epee is also an electrical weapon. The blade is wired with a springloaded tip at the end that completes an electrical

circuit when it is depressed beyond a pressure of 750 grams. This causes the colored bulb on the scoring machine to light. Because the entire body is a valid target area, the epee fencer's uniform does not include a lame and the white lights (off target) are closed out of the circuit for epee fencing.

Sabre

The sabre is the modern version of the slashing calvary sword, and is similar in length and weight to the foil. The major difference is that the

sabre is a point thrusting weapon as well as a cutting weapon (use of the

blade). The target area is the entire upper body from the bend of the hips (both front and back), simulating the cavalry rider on a horse. The sabre fencer's uniform includes a metallic jacket. which covers the target area

to register a valid touch on the scoring machine. The mask is different from foil and epee, with a metallic covering since the head is a valid

target area.

The fencer attaches a sensor to his weapon and clips a reel wire to his metallic jacket. Just as in foil, there are two scoring lights on the machine. One shows a green light when a fencer is hit, and one shows a red light when the opponent is hit.

Right-Of-Way

One of the most difficult concepts in foil and sabre fencing is the rule of right-of-way. This rule was established to eliminate simultaneous attacks by two fencers.

The concept of right-of-way is predicated on the assumption that self-preservation is more important than the "killing" of one's opponent. To gain right-of-way, a fencer must either initiate an attack by extending the arm, or, if the opponent has initiated the attack, complete a successful defense before attempting a counter attack. In short, if a fencer's opponent is threatening the target. the threat must be removed before an attack can be mounted.

The director (a fencing official or referee) determines the right-of-way.

On calling the fencing action, the director awards the touch to the fencer with the right-of-way who has registered a colored light on the scoring machine. Epee does not use the right-of-way in keeping with its dueling origin -he who hits first gains the touch and if both hit within 1/ 25th of a second of each other, both earn a point. However, it is equally important to have a sound defense for epee, since the entire body must be protected from a touch.

How To Follow The Action

For those new to fencing, it is difficult to follow the lightning speed of the fencers' actions. To become more comfortable in watching a fencing bout, focus on one fencer. The fencer being attacked defends himself by use of a "parry," a motion used to deflect the opponent's blade, after which the defender can make a "riposte," an answering attack. Thus, the two adversaries keep changing between offense and defense. Whenever a hit is made, the director will stop the bout, describe the actions, and decide on the award of a touch.

Fencers seek to maintain a safe distance from each other, that is, out of range of the other's attack. Then, one will try to "break" this distance to gain the advantage for an attack. At times, a fencer will make a "false" attack to gauge the types of reactions by the opponent that can be deceived in the "real" attack.

As you become accustomed to the speed of the game, the tactics and strategies become more apparent, and you will gain a better understanding for the finesse and fascina-

tion of the Olympic sport of fencing!

Electrical Flashing

When You See ... It Means ...

Red/Green Light

A point or blade has landed in a valid target area. A touch is scored for the fencer who makes the touch, depending on the director's decision of right-ofwav.

White Light

Occasionally in foil, thepoint lands at a place outsidethevalid target area. No point is awarded for an off-target hit.

White & Colored

The point first landed off target, then on target. No point is awarded because an off-target nullifies a following valid hit.

One or more lights The decision of

right-of-way by the director will determine which fencer will receive the touch. In the case of epee, a is touch awarded to both.

O lympic Games

The Olympics of the modern era began in 1896 with fencing as one of the nine original sports (the others were athletics, cycling, gymnastics, shooting, swimming, tennis, weightlifting and yachting). Fencing is one of only four of those sports (fencing, athletics, gymnastics, swimming) to have been conducted at every Olympic Games.

The competition in Athens consisted of individual foil and sabre only and the United States did not field a team. Although the U.S. sent a group to the 1904 Games in St. Louis, the U.S. did not send a formal contingent until the 1912 Olympic Games in Stockholm.

In the 96 years of the modern Olympics, fencers have served in notable roles for U.S. Olympic Teams - as flag bearers and oathtakers.

Bearing the Stars and Stripes

At the Opening Ceremonies of every Olympic Games since 1908, each country's team is preceded into the stadium by that country's flag. The flag bearer for U.S. Olympic Teams is usually chosen by his or her fellow athletes.

Of the 17 athletes chosen to carry the U.S. flag at the 19 Summer Games ceremonies, fencers are second behind athletics, having carried the flag three times. Athletics tops the list with 11 flag bearers, while Equestrian, Gymnastics, Swimming and Yachting have each had one

athlete bear the stars and stripes.

At the 1968 Olympic Games, fencer Janice York Romary, competing on her sixth Olympic Team, was selected to carry the U.S. flag, becoming the first woman ever and the second fencer. Norman C. Armitage was granted the same honor at both the 1952 and 1956 Olympic Games.

Most recently, at the 1992 Olympic Games in Barcelona, Spain, fencer Peter Westbrook just missed carrying the flag in a vote of the team captains. Instead, marathoner Francie Larrieu Smith was elected.

Westbrook was later granted the honor to carry the U.S. flag in the closing ceremonies.

In the name ...

Sixteen athletes have taken the Olympic Oath since this tradition began at the 1920 Summer Games. The oathtaker is usually an athlete from the host country who takes the oath on behalf of all of the athletes.

Eight athletics competitors have taken the oath, including Edwin Moses at the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles, followed by three gymnasts, two fencers, two weightlifters and one soccer player.

Belgian fencer Victor Boin had this honor of being the first athlete ever to take the Olympic Oath at the 1920 Games, U.S. fencer George Calnan received this distinction at the 1932 Olympic Games in Los Angeles.



Women's Epee Added to '96 Games

The Federation Internationale d'Escrime (FIE) announced on March 22, 1993 that the International Olympic Committee approved the addition of women's epee to the schedule of the 1996 Olympic Games, as both an individual and team event.

This brings the number of women's events to four (individual and team women's foil and epee), with the men at six (individual and team foil, epee and sabre).

"While the future of fencing the Olympic Games was strongly contested no more than six months ago, this decision brings to an end the fears that we shared and provides for a solid future for our sport within the Olympic framework," FIE President Rene Roch stated in his announcement.

Women's epee achieved world status at the 1989 World Championships in Denver. It was initiated in the United States as a National Championship event in 1981. Its recognition on a world level and now at the Olympic Games has given the impetus for growth in participation by women throughout the world.

S election Criteria

Olympic Festival

All competitors will be senior fencers except five junior fencers in each weapon.

Members of the following teams receive an automatic invitation: 1992 Olympic Team, 1992 Women's Epee World Championships Team, 1993 World Championships Team, 1993 World Under-20 Championships Team, 1993 World University Games Team.

The balance of the senior fencers will be selected according to the following: the point standings will be the sum of the three highest points earned at NAC #1 (Dec. '92), NAC #2 (Jan. '93), NAC #3 (April '93), '93 Division I National Championships, and each non-designated "A" world cup event held between Dec. 1, 1992 and May 31, 1993 PLUS the sum of all points earned at designated "A" world cup tournaments between Dec. 1, 1992 and May 31, 1993.

The balance of the junior fencers will be selected according to the following: the point standings will be the sum of the three highest points earned at Junior NAC #1 (Oct. '92), Junior NAC #2 (Nov. '92), '93 Junior Olympic Championships, NAC #1 (Dec. '92), NAC #2 (Jan. '93), NAC #3 (April '93), Division I National Championships (June '93) each non-designated "A" world cup event held between Dec. 1, 1992 and May 31, 1993

AND the sum of all points earned at Under-20"A" world cup tournaments between Sept. 1, 1992 and March 15, 1993, the 1993 World Under-20 Championships and senior "A" World Cup tournaments between Dec. 1, 1992 and May 31, 1993.

World Championships

Five fencers in each of the five weapons will be selected to the team based on the following: the sum of the two highest points earned at NAC#1(Dec. '92), NAC#2(Jan. '93), NAC#3 (April '93), non-designated "A" events between Dec. 1, 1992 and May 31, 1993 PLUS the sum of all points earned at designated "A" events held between Jan. 1, 1993 and May 31, 1993.

World University Games

Five fencers in each of the five weapons will be selected to the team based on the following: the sum of the two highest points earned at NAC #1 (Dec. '92), NAC #2 (Jan. '93), NAC #3 (April '93), non-designated "A" events between Dec. 1, 992 and May 31, 1993 PLUS the sum of all points earned at designated "A" events held between Jan. 1, 1993 and May 31, 1993.
