## Selection of Olympic Team

Jose R. de Capriles, Chairman of the Committee

The Olympic Fencing Committee met on June 15th and selected the 1956 Olympic Team. Nine of the twelve members were present: Norman Armitage, Lajos Csiszar, Jose de Capriles, Miguel de Capriles, Leonard Doughty, James Flynn, Alvar Hermanson, Tracy Jaeckel and Nickolas Muray. Absent for business reasons were Edward Carfagno, Ralph Goldstein and Howard Hayden. The announcement of the Team on Gala Night brought the inevitable joy and heartbreak, but the Committee was keenly aware of the deep responsibility to select the best possible combination without sentiment or prejudice.

The point system proved very helpful in the majority of cases but it was inevitable that difficult choices should arise where two or more men with comparable records were bidding for the sixth place. The various weights given to six Olympic Tryouts produced a gross score and gave an indication of each man's performance as the pressure increased; an average score, to equalize the performance ratio between individuals who had not had equal scoring opportunities, also proved very helpful. In general, a spread of less than 12 gross points among those with equal scoring opportunities, or one percentage point if opportunities were unequal, was inconclusive as to relative abilities and the Committee had to rely on its collective judgment for the ultimate decision.

Due to the lapse of time before the team's departure (November 4 or 5) the Committee named alternates for every team as well as for Captain and Coach-Trainer.

**Women.** The top six contenders had the following record:

There was no problem in selecting the three girls for Melbourne: Mitchell, Romary and Goodrich. As alternates, the decision was to name Feig first alternate and Dyer second. Dyer's higher score was due to the North-Atlantic championship at which neither Feig nor Balint could compete; Feig competed in only two events, tied for third in the nationals and has a good background in international fencing.

There was no problem in selecting the first five. Between Krieger and Turk there was a considerable gross point spread due to the fact that Krieger had been unable to compete in any tryout previous to the nationals. His superior average despite lack of opportunities to train seriously, and his international experience, led the Committee to feel he could be of greater value. Turk was of course named first alternate, with Kwartler second and Steinhardt third over Velasco for the same reasons as Krieger over Turk.

The first five places posed no problem. For sixth place there was considerable discussion of the relative contribution to the team effort as between Goldstein, Vebell and Wolff, all of whom have international experience. Each man has certain assets but the Committee was unanimous in selecting Goldstein with Vebell as first alternate and Wolff second. Berry was named third over Bickley in the belief he can rise to greater heights.

Here again there was no difficulty in selecting the first five. For sixth place three men were bunched with an average difference of less than one place. Gorlin's gross had been earned by 4 good performances prior to the metropolitan and national championships; in these two last events he was out-scored by Treves while Armitage won the metropolitan title.

Treves had competed in only three events and had placed 8th, 6th and 6th. Armitage won the Metropolitan championship in which both Gorlin and Treves fenced, and had tied for first in the February tryout. The Committee felt Treves had not demonstrated an ability to rise above the medium level while Armitage was still capable of reaching the top against any opposition. Armitage was unanimously selected, with Gorlin first alternate. Treves second and Blum third.

The selection of Olympic coaches was based on two considerations: (1), the men who were currently teaching several members of the Team; (2), availability for training of the Team as a unit from August to November. The Olympic Committee has no authority to appoint Olympic coaches as mere recognition of talent or as an honorary position. The following men were named:

Michel Alaux, Lajos Csiszar, Edward Lucia, Odon Niederkerchner and George Santelli.

Only one coach-trainer is permitted to make the trip to Melbourne and from the above group the Committee selected Lajos Csiszar of the University of Pennsylvania with Edward Lucia of C.C.N.Y., as the alternate.

Jose de Capriles was chosen Captain with Dr. James Flynn and Nickolas Muray as alternates in that order. Inasmuch as only two non-competitors are to accompany the Team to Melbourne, George Worth will do double duty and will act as Manager.

## Official AFLA Notes

**CHANGE IN CLASSIFICATION.** Divisions are put on notice that the new Rules Book which will not be printed until the Fall will contain a change in classification of fencers. Although exact definitions and terminology are not yet available, schedules should be planned on the basis of three instead of the present four main groups. It is contemplated that fencers will be "unclassified" for the first season of competition (in effect the present "prep" group); there will be an "unranked" or "third-class" group taking in all the "novice" and possibly some "junior" fencers; an "intermediate" or "second-class" group comprising the present "intermediate," some "junior" and some "senior" fencers; a "first-class" group.

### ANNUAL MEETING

The Annual Meeting of the AFLA was held at the Fencers Club on June 10 at 8 PM and was well attended by representatives of twenty divisions.

The Secretary reported that there were 41 Divisions and membership as of June 1 was 2,163 with 5 Divisions yet to report. At the annual meeting last year the membership was 2,080.

The new officers elected for 1956-57 were: Jose de Capriles, president; Harold Van Buskirk, vice-president; Gerard Biagini, 2nd vice-president; Edmond Zeisig, 3rd vice-president; Calvert E. Schlick, 4th vice-president; Ralph Goldstein, secretary; Leo Sobel, treasurer; Tracy Jaeckel, foreign secretary.

The creation of a Metropolitan N.Y. division was approved, and the following amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws were passed:

**Article III, Sec. 1.** (Add at the end): "Life Associate Membership shall consist of those qualified to be Associate Members who shall pay the Life Associate Membership fee specified in the By-Laws. They shall have all the rights and privileges of Associate Members but shall be exempt from the obligation of paying dues subsequent to the payment of the Life Associate Membership fee."

**Article IV, Sec. 2.** (New) "The Non-Divisional Group shall be administered by the officers of the League and the Board of Governors."

**Chapter II, Sec. 1.** (Change present (g) to (h) and insert new (g) as follows: "The Life Associate Membership fee shall be \$50. Where the applicant has been a member of the League in good standing for ten or more years, the Life Associate Membership fee shall be \$25. If the Life Associate Member is a member of a Division, two-thirds shall be retained by the League and one-third shall be paid over to the Division."

**Chapter VII** (New) "Non-Divisional Governors. **Section 1**—Each year prior to June 1st the Board of Governors shall elect the appropriate number of Non-Divisional Governors who shall take office as of the next ensuing Annual Meeting of the Board and shall hold office until their successors are elected. (See Const., Art IV, Sec. 1 (I)). **Section 2**—Vacancies occurring in the office of Non-Divisional Governor between Annual Meetings shall be filled for the unexpired term by the Board of Governors."

# The 1956 Nationals

The most important thing about this year's Nationals was of course the contest for places on the Olympic Team. But of great significance for the future of the sport in this country was the large number of good young athletes who are beginning to mature as fencers and who gave such an excellent account of themselves. We have no doubt that many of them will be in the winners' circle within the next few years.

In all the men's individual events there was uncertainty as to the winner and runner-up until the very last bout had been fenced; in the women's event few, if any, doubted that Romary and Mitchell would place one-two. As it was, Abram Cohen (in epee, of all weapons) was the only champion who retained his crown. The size and quality of the field in these events places a premium on physical condition and it is apparent that several of our top veterans must get into better shape or make way for the "hungry" youngsters. By the same token Sewall Shurtz, one of the best-conditioned entries, was the only one to win two individual medals—champion in foil and third in epee. Tibor Nyilas regained the sabre crown; what he lacks physically is compensated by his exceptionally fine technique and tactical supremacy.

The team events resulted in the maximum distribution of titles. No club won more than one crown. The Air Force's victory in the three-weapon team was very popular and will undoubtedly give an impetus to the fencing program of all three armed services. The service program has helped to increase interest in fencing and, if continued, represents an asset to the A.F.L.A. and to our future international teams.

Each of the last several years we have been proud to report that the National Tournament was "the largest ever." It was true again this year, despite an increase in the entry fee, with 303 individual competitors and 49 teams representing 25 divisions, the non-divisional group, the three armed forces, Canada, Mexico and Viet Nam. Argentina's Pan-American epee champion also competed, but he qualified from Detroit where he has been living this past year. A tournament of such magnitude cannot be planned and conducted without the unselfish assistance of many individuals. The Bout and Arrangements Committees did an excellent job and we must give special thanks to Tom Bickley, James Castello, Irving DeKoff, Dernel Every, Edward Lucia, Pieter Mijer, Tony Orsi and Leo Sobel. A host of officials from the divisions and the metropolitan area contributed to the success of the tournament and the staff of the Concourse Plaza Hotel gave us full cooperation.

The added income from entry fees enabled us to spend more money in trying to make this Tournament a truly gala event. The hotel facilities made it possible to maintain a reasonable time schedule, and the banners of divisions and clubs from all parts of the country created a pleasant atmosphere.

The Salle Santelli continued its unquestioned supremacy in the sabre field and gave up only three bouts in its defense of the title. Alex Treves starred for the champions, winning all nine of his bouts. It is with deep regret that we announce the death of Arthur Muray in Barcelona, Spain, on Sunday, July 29th.

Mr. Muray was for many years an active fencer who represented several New York clubs and, with his brother Nickolas, made up one of our most famous fencing families. His last major achievement in fencing was winning the 1934 National Sabre Team title while representing the Fencers Club. Thereafter his health began to fail and he was compelled to travel. An excellent photographer and painter, he captured the color of Colorado, Mexico and Spain. Last year he held a one-man art exhibit in Barcelona and received high tribute from the critics.

The Salle Csiszar won its first epee team title with a well-balanced team which presented three strikingly different types of epeeists. The Air Force won a popular victory in this event, with Lt. Robert Goldman turning in a perfect record in foil. It seemed proper that the first major title ever won by the Air Force should be dignified by a trophy in memory of an armed forces immortal who captained our Olympic Team in 1932 and was our first Olympic epee medalist. The Salle Csiszar added to its previous laurels by placing second, while the young officers from the Third Naval District placed third.

This event immediately followed the epee team and for a moment in the final match it seemed likely that the Salle Csiszar would win two crowns in one day. Although they had dropped the foil bout, Ruben led Kolowrat 4-2 in epee with time running out and the national sabre champion, Dyer, scheduled to meet Col. Carhart; Kolowrat capitalized on Ruben's momentary lapse, evened the score and finally won the match on a beautifully executed false attack and parry-riposte.

For the first time in the history of our National Tournament a team consisting of only two members, forfeiting two or three bouts in each match, nevertheless won the championship. 

Dr. Tibor Nyilas regained the crown he had worn on four previous occasions. Despite an injury to his instep during the final round, he fenced brilliantly and re-emphasized this writer's opinion that when he wants to fence there is no one who can do so more beautifully or effectively. Allan Kwartler fenced better than ever to place second while Gorge Worth finished third. The defending champion, Richard Dyer, took fourth over Abram Cohen on touches. The surprises in this event were the strong performance of Ed Richards of the Salle Elde in reaching the final; the promise shown by Sigfried Jesswin, John Krajcir and John Cameron in the semi-final; and the elimination in the semi-final of Metropolitan Champion Norman Armitage and last year's runner-up Sol Gorlin.

Abram Cohen was the only individual champion to retain his title, and his performance is worthy of special note because such a feat is rarely accomplished in epee. Since 1892 two men have held the epee title three years in a row (Thatham '01, '02, '03 and Lewis '48, '49, '50) only two others have defended successfully (DeLaPoer '09, '10 and Heiss '33, '34). To earn this distinction Cohen had to defeat William Andre in a fence-off; Andre had won 5-3 in the regular final, but the champion turned the tables by the same score in the fence-off. Sewall Shurtz placed third on touches over Ralph Goldstein, and thus became a medalist for the third year in a row—which is also a rare consistency. The final of twelve contained more young, fine athletes than ever before and reflects the trend in this weapon.





Sewall Shurtz turned in the surprise victory of the individuals by dethroning Albert Axelrod. Shurtz had shown rapid improvement and had reached the semi-finals of the World Championships in Rome this past year, but it was not expected that he could take the title from either Axelrod or Bukantz. In addition to his improved technique a great deal of credit goes to his excellent physical conditioning, since he had fenced in the gruelling 12man epee final the day before. Axelrod placed second on touches over Bukantz. It was the closest foil final on record. All places except first and ninth were decided on the count of touches. A 3-way tie for fourth on bouts and touches against was resolved in favor of Lubell, followed by Krieger and Goldsmith. Seventh and eighth was also decided on the count of touches. Rene Pinchuk was a surprise finalist, eliminating such strong foils as Kwartler, Strauch and Ostrofsky in the semi-final. All the top men had trouble with their electric foils and need intensive practice with it this summer.

# INTERNATIONAL . . .

## THE F.I.E. CONGRESS

By Lt. Col. Thomas Carhart, USAF

I attended the annual Congress at Milan as AFLA representative. There were of course many matters of interest, but I will summarize herein only those which affect us and should be known to the full membership.

The new President of the F.I.E. is to be Mr. P. Ferri of France.

The World Women's Team Championships for 1956 will be held at London on September 14 and 15; it is a pity that we can't send our top four girls who could very probably win it.

The World Championships for 1957 are to be held at Budapest around the 15th of July.

The following rules were passed for IMMEDIATE application:

1. In foil and sabre a touch which arrives off the target—whether before or after a parry—will be a foul which stops the phrase and annuls all subsequent touches.

2. Final pools at official F.I.E. events must be composed of a minimum of 8 fencers.

3. For electric foil:

(a) The bib of the mask must not extend more than 2 cms. below collar of jacket when on guard.

(b) The metallic jacket **must exactly** cover the target and fit closely. The chief fault is that men's jackets are cut from the waist down to the groin, whereas the target is groin to the top of the hips.

(c) The metallic jacket **must** have a collar with a minimum height around the neck of 2 cms.

(d) The spring of the point must push back a weight of 500 gms.

(e) "The lighting stroke can be infinitesimal. The total travel of the pointe d'arret must be a maximum of 1 mm." This, it is hoped, will simplify construction. **Points with or without lighting stroke will be allowed at Melbourne.**

(f) "The diameter of the body of the point must be between 5 and 6 mm. The active surface of the pointe d'arret is composed of a half-sphere which must have the same diameter as the body of the point. The half-spherical surface can be incised in the same way as the epee pointe d'arret, taking into account the difference in diameter." Therefore the electrical foil points can now be smaller replicas of the epee points. The former type foil points can still be used if desired.

(g) Proper foil jackets having a double thickness inside the sleeve and covering the flank around the arm pit **must** be worn under the metallic jacket. This is to prevent the growing practice of wearing very light jackets with thin sleeves for coolness under the metal jacket, which is unsafe with the more rigid foil blades now used.

(h) A plastic paint may now be used to cover the end of the foil blade instead of insulating tape.

(i) A silicone material can be vaporized on metallic handles to eliminate the slight shock sometimes felt when a fencer is perspiring.

4. Equipment for Melbourne. All competitors must take with them ample supplies of spare blades for all weapons. Blades should be ready for mounting. Some material will be available in Melbourne but it will be very expensive.

5. The Directoire Technique for the Olympic Games will consist of: Rene Mercier (France); G. Rosgonyi (Hungary); V. Cucchia (Italy); Mr. Littay and Mr. Warrender (Australia); a representative of South America yet to be named; a representative of North America to be named by Jose de Capriles.

6. The following were admitted to membership: East Germany, Hong Kong, Indonesia and Tangiers.


