

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

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

Major Changes Underway for AMERICAN FENCING

Calling all editors: the USFA seeks a new volunteer wordsmith to lead the association's official publication into the next century!

It has always been my preference to use this space to bring good news to the readers of AMERICAN FENCING. I'm pleased to report that there is much to be happy about.

On the international scene, our fencers posted good results at the Pan American Games and at the World Veterans Championships, where the U. S. vets won five medals, including Ray Sexton's gold in the age 50-59 men's sabre. Cliff Bayer's world cup victory is our first in a very long time.

Domestically, too, things look good. The Development Grant program and growth awards continue to assist clubs across the country. The USFA web site has become a virtual town square for fencing and fencers, and we just inked a contract that will make internet services, and home page sites in particular, available to all of our clubs and divisions. We are extending referee training and services to make them ever more accessible to local fencing and revamping our tournament schedule. The changes in the calendar will reemphasize divisional and regional competition, while at the same time providing new and better opportunities for Division II and III fencers to experience national competition.

While I would like to dwell on these and other pleasant topics, unfortunately, I must at this point turn my attention — and I hope yours — to a less happy circumstance. Candi MacConaugh, the editor of this magazine and its inspiration for the past seven years, is leaving that post. Not only must we bid her an appreciative farewell, but we must find a successor, and must do so quickly.

When Candi assumed responsibility for this magazine it was a far less sophisticated journal than the one we know today. It is astonishing to realize that the majority of our members never saw the predecessor publication and have never known another editor. They have no appreciation for how far AMERICAN FENCING has come or how much it has changed under Candi's leadership.

Nor do most members understand how hard she labored for fencing during those years. It surprises many people to learn that production of this magazine is a volunteer function. For seven years, Candi has sat at a computer terminal in her kitchen on her own time, soliciting copy, editing submissions, selecting photographs, writing captions and headlines, laying out pages and doing the myriad necessary things, most of which I will never know or understand, to make a magazine. She has often traveled to the printer at six o'clock in the morning because she has a fulltime job. Since 1992, she has devoted thousands of hours so that we might have this magazine in our

mailboxes four times each year.

Those of us who are long enough of tooth to remember the earlier incarnations of the

magazine, and those who don't but who do enjoy today's publication, should take a minute to thank Candi for her good work and enormous contributions.

Candi's resignation leaves us the task of filling one of the most important jobs in the volunteer administration of the USFA. Recent changes in publication management have eased the editor's burden. No longer must the editor handle the magazine's business functions. The publisher's responsibilities are being shifted to the staff of the National Office where they can be more effectively and economically pursued. We are also looking for ways to improve and coordinate all of our media outlets, AMERICAN FENCING, the USFA National Newsletter, the Media Guide and our web site. These steps should significantly ease the editor's responsibilities, reducing the total time commitment needed to produce the magazine and leaving more time for the creative opportunities of the position.

When Candi assumed the editor's position, she remade the magazine to effectuate her vision of what it could be. Now it is time for a new editor and a new vision.

Candi has offered to help her successor with the transition, but she will not be available to take principal editorial responsibility after the current issue. This means we must on short notice find a competent, knowledgeable and diligent editor to take the helm of AMERICAN FENCING and lead it into the next century and the next

Olympic quadrennium.

I urge each member of the Association to consider the matter of the magazine, and its importance to the membership. It remains the best source of information on fencing in this country. We each need to inquire of all potential editors about their desire and willingness to undertake the job. Please contact Candi (email: candimac@usswim.org), officer liaison Buzz Hurst (619.584.2478), or the USFA National Office (719.578.4511), with the names of any candidates. Those who are considering the position should send their indications of interest to the USFA Office. Finding the right person might well be the most important contribution you make to the USFA and its members.

With Candi's departure we are again reminded of a lesson that we confront time after time, but rarely seem to learn. Despite the increasing professionalism and efficacy of the National Office, ours remains an organization dependent on volunteers. Whether meet managers at division weekend tournaments, members of the Board of Directors or, for that matter, editors of this magazine, the volunteers of the USFA give their time, money and souls to fencing, and they receive little recognition or reward.

So, Candi, I salute you in gratitude and appreciation. We should all rise for a round of applause in recognition of your gifts of time, talent and energy, for which fencing is so much the better.

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If you're a desktop publishing dynamo, a wizard with words, who wants to have a major impact on the communications efforts of the sport you love ...

Kudos for the USFA

I would like to make a brief report to the Executive Committee as the Developmental Coach representative of the USFA.

This year, the Coach of the Year Award was held in Washington DC and was attended by Vladimir Nazlimov, the USFA National Coach of the Year, Donald Alperstein, President of the USFA, and myself.

The purpose of the Awards is to celebrate the ideal of coaching by the USOC. They essentially wined and dined and "activitied" us for three days, treating us like we were foreign dignitaries.

But beyond the simple celebration of coaching excellence, something else happened as well. In this time, the various sports' representatives talked to each other about their success and their problems. In virtually every instance, the concerns were no different: getting new athletes, keeping athletes, motivation, tournaments, dealing with their National Governing Body, and so on.

Several things were made apparent to me last weekend, that I think you should know.

We assume so readily that the USFA is a poorly run organization, filled with political factions and pettiness. Compared to other sports, as seen by their coach representatives, we have fewer problems than most.

We assume that our coaching level is quite low. It is not so! As the developmental coach, I exceeded most of the comparable qualifications of other sports developmental and national coaches. Use the achievements of Vladimir Nazlimov, both in Russia and in the US and he readily exceeds or equals the qualifications of any other sports' representatives. I agree that some sports are more visible publicly and therefore their coaches's results take on seemingly more importance.

I believe that our past representatives, Abel Salem, Buckie Leach, Aladar Kogler, and Andrea Lagan — also showed equal high ability compared to that of other sports.

I listened to other sports's coaches explain how their sport's organization works. How it manages age and skill level events that are comparable to our NAC events. How they qualify for their National Championships. How their sport's NGB helps or doesn't help them as coaches or help their athletes.

All I am left with is a profound relief that I am dealing with the USFA and not one of their organizations. It simply isn't that you like what you know; these others sports are just wrong or at least as explained by their coach representatives.

I realize that as members of the USFA Executive Committee you hear nothing but problems about fencing. You can hardly pick up a copy of AMERICAN FENCING or VETERAN'S FENCERS QUARTERLY without reading some complaint. Any conversation between fencers or coaches seems to be why isn't the USFA doing more.

I want to relate to you, from my experience at this year's Awards, that the USFA is doing a fine job. It rewards development of fencers and coaching. Its programs make sense. It's tournaments make sense. So while fencers complain and find fault, while there is room for

improvement, the great bulk of the USFA is headed in the right direction.

Also, look at it from another point of view. Ten years ago there were 7,000 members of the USFA, this year almost 15,000. These people would not stay members, the coaches would not sign up new

members, if they weren't getting something from the USFA.

From a different perspective, our fencers's abilities would not be improving is the USFA was not meeting the needs of its athletes and coaches.

So I recommend to you that you take a moment of appreciation amongst yourselves for the work that you have done. Also, that you continue to make fencing one of the best sports of the USOC.

As a sport we will never be the most popular, but we can be the best managed.

My sincerest thanks to you for naming me this year's Developmental Coach representative.

Why Are Tournaments So Poorly Run?

I started getting involved with national level events (NACs) in the late 1970s - first as a competitor, later as Fencers Club team captain/coach, and finally as a local organizer. From each of these vantage points, I felt these cumbersome tournaments were fraught with problems - inexplicable delays and errors in seeding, inadequate venues, under-qualified referees, inefficient, unresponsive and disorganized management - all of which tended to exacerbate my now infamous reputation for intolerance.... I challenge the ruling oligarchy of the USFA to answer today's \$64,000.00 question - why are tournaments run so poorly?

All committees involved in tournament operation must actively solicit and respond to criticism from competitors and coaches. Inviting criticism does not create fractious discord. Rather, it encourages thoughtful review, dialogue, new ideas and a greater sense of enfranchisement for all parties concerned.

Operational issues or, Mission: not so Impossible

1. Check in, seeding and our friend the computer: The check in process involves waiting in line so that volunteers can find your name on a list and mark you present (presuming your entry form was received and properly executed). For competitions with large entries (i.e.: open men's epee) this process can, in itself, be very time consuming, and run well beyond the listed closing time. When entries are closed, this list is brought to the bout committee, who announce the names of those who have not registered, after which the entry list is amended, the seeding is posted, and the pools are printed. Sounds simple enough. Why then should tournaments have one-hour-plus delays in starting after the close of check in? Reason #1: manual entries take too long and increase the likelihood of human error. The simplest solution would be a magnetic card registration system (USFA cards could be inexpensively fabricated with magnetic strips), where competitors could swipe a card through a reader, have someone review the screen, and voila, you're entered. Those with cards missing could be manually located in the computer by a volunteer. When the process is completed, a list of all those not registered could be printed out immediately, announcements made, seeding printed, and strips put out in half an hour. Additionally, computer equipment and printers should be fully tested the night before. Preliminary seeding (based on predetermined, sensible criteria) must be done at least one week in advance, and e-mailed to the local organizers - not left to the last minute.

2. Start times for multi-event days or, on your mark; get set; wait: When you have to run five to ten events over a long weekend, it becomes obvious that more than one event must be held each day. The M.O. of the tournament committee has been to "sandwich" the first rounds of each event (presumably starting the one with the largest entry first), allowing sufficient time for completion before starting successive events and direct elimination rounds. The net effect is that fencers in event #1 will wait an eternity between pool completion and the start of the D.E. - particularly if they have the "misfortune" of getting a bye. Under the new open format, the top 16 fencers in the running point standings get a bye to the round of 48. It's always a mystery as to when they will start fencing. It would be far better if the start times for each event were staggered sufficiently so that all pools and D.E. bouts up to the round of 32 (in the case of the new format), and through the winner vs. winner, loser vs. loser bracket (in the traditional D.E. format with repechage) could be fenced. Additionally, first rounds should be automatically double stripped whenever possible. With all available strips and referees dedicated to one event at a time (until that competition progressed to this point) it is less likely that the bout committee would lose track or control of each event's progress. This would also permit the round of 48 (under the new system) to be scheduled on the following day (as it is in many European world cup competitions) at a pre-set time. In the case of the traditional D.E. with repechage from 32 (still used in junior and cadet tournaments), the remainder of the competition (24 fencers) could be efficiently completed on as few as eight strips, while the next event started. Fencers and coaches would gladly accept a later start for greater contiguity between successive rounds.

3. Strip monitors, momentum, and Mt. Olympus: Ever notice how the bout committee always seems to be placed on a platform or elevated proscenium? The standard rationale for this man-made Mt. Olympus is that it insulates bout committee members from the unwarranted distractions of inquisitive competitors. Unfortunately, even the Greek Gods came down from their Mt. Olympus to mingle with the mortals with greater frequency than our bout committees do. One slow moving pool or D.E. quadrant can delay an entire competition 30-45 minutes. While each member of the bout committee remains comfortably sequestered on Mt. Olympus, blissfully unaware of the progress of each strip or quadrant back on earth, one to three hours are typically added to the total running time of a tournament. This problem is easily solved by having a group of volunteers continually monitoring and reporting on the progress of each strip to the bout committee. Any strips falling far behind could be doubled up as soon as the delay was noted. Additionally, strip monitors could expedite communication between the referees and the armorers in the advent of technical problems.

4. As competitions slog along, bout committees tend to decelerate their pace. D.E. bouts in the later stages of the recharge table take longer to send out, and the announcing of finalists seems to take forever. I have suffered through many tournaments where there was literally a 45 minute gap between the last touch in first place bout and the awards ceremonies. With the hotel restaurants in "Obscurityville," USA stopping service after 10:00 PM, finalists end up hungry as well as exasperated. This loss of momentum must be carefully guarded against by the tournament committee reps. They should be constantly aware of the total elapsed time of each competition running with the ultimate goal of finishing as quickly as possible.

5. Referees, armorers and other masochists: No two collections of poor souls take more abuse than referees and armorers. They thanklessly toil the same number of hours for the same pay scale as Guatemalan migrant farm workers. Ironically, the average referee is as much a victim of poor competition management as the fencers. Over a four day period, they are typically "on call" 12-15 hours per day. It is impossible not to expect quality of work to deteriorate under these conditions. The FOC constantly pleads that there are not enough referees to properly service all our national events, and they lack the resources to develop more. These statements are a bit disconcerting, coming from a committee whose budget allegedly exceeds \$250,000.00. One solution that I have supported is the use of "temp" referees - qualified fencers not competing and coaches or parents who might be available on any given day. I have refereed at Junior World Cup Competitions well into the direct elimination rounds, and the gold medal bout of a designated Canadian open men's foil event, and yet I have never been recruited by the FOC to take the rating exam. Most fencers are unaware that they could have some portion of their hotel or airfare subsidized if they worked as referees when not competing. The FOC must aggressively conscript from among this population and use all such resources to the fullest.

We deserve better.

The History of Fencing: Foundations of Modern European Sword Play

by William M. Gaugler

THE HISTORY OF FENCING will be recognized as a basic book in its field; it belongs on the shelves of all major libraries. Fencing manuals and fencing traditions, early modern to contemporary, heretofore accessible only to readers of French, German, and Italian, Gaugler opens gracefully to English language readers. In a volume encompassing over 500 pages (counting fore matter, text, and scholarly apparatus), the first 75 pages review fencing in the sixteenth through eighteenth centuries; 200 more pages are dedicated to nineteenth-century fencing; one hundred and 50 more survey fencing in the twentieth century.

A comprehensive study, no phase of fencing is treated more fully than that of method, which is viewed with attention to continuity and change in recommendations on technique. How to grip the weapon, how to stand, how to lunge, how to counter, answers to such questions and many more are treated in detail. A generous index facilitates understanding of past and present views on "absence of blade," "advance," "arrest," "bind," "counterattack," "countertime," "cut-over," "defense," and so on alphabetically through "straight thrust," "time thrust," and "weapon in line"-to cite only a few of the pertinent entries.

Although this book will be of interest primarily to fencers, amateurs and professionals alike, readers interested in the broader history of physical education may find unexpected riches. For example, passages translated from early modern manuals emphasizing civility and decorum reveal a kinship with the tradition of courtesy literature known especially through such works as Baldassare Castiglione's *Courtier (Il Cortegiano)*, 1528). Works on courtesy (i.e., manners appropriate to court life), written in the spirit of Castiglione, recognized the importance of physical education. Such works indicated that the culture of the blade was informed by codes of social conduct, not merely technical competence.

The courtesy tradition remained notably apparent in rules Luigi Lambertini formulated for the fencing room in his *Trattato di scherma* (1870), e.g., "All individuals occupying the fencing room must behave in a civil and educated manner. ... During fencing, if one of the two fencers is by chance disarmed, and his weapon drops, the other, regardless of his rank, must pick it up and consign it to his adversary by the guard, in order to avoid any idea of haughtiness. ..." (Gaugler, p. 169). The tradition also had implications for fencing teachers, as seen in the *Manuel d'escrime* (1877): "the master and his assistants must set an example for their students. Their speech should be calm and measured. They must be loyal and irreproachable in their conduct. And they must maintain a dignity and pride that brings respect to the uniform, and earns them the esteem and consideration of their pupils" (Gaugler, p. 215).

Gaugler's HISTORY includes illustrations of fencers and fencing postures or stances, some of them from sixteenth-century sources.

Inspection reveals small letters beside the illustrated figures. These letters relate to subtexts (not reprinted in the present edition) which explain the subjects illustrated. Students of the history of reading instruction may recognize here a first step in the paraphernalia of instructional texts which culminated a century later with the publication of John Amos Comenius's *Orbis Sensualium Pictus* (Nürnberg, 1658). The most famous school text of the early modern era, it passed through some 223 editions by 1896, and was read from London to Moscow. Whereas sixteenth-century instructional texts ranging from military manuals to *The Geneva Bible* (1560) might code images with letters or numbers for purposes of identification or explanation, Comenius innovatively employed the system to link images and words in two languages and within sequences of sentences forming narratives.

Editions of *Orbis Pictus* offer a crude index to the changing social status of fencing and an indication of author attitudes toward

Here the subject is unambiguously the fencing school. No blind-folded boxers or wrestlers intrude. Moreover, the lesson ranges into outright commendation: "Among the exercises serving to encrease the perfect growth of the body, the art of fencing holds a preeminent situation; for it makes a person not only nimbler but also healthier." Gailer was aware that duels were still sometimes fought with blades; this he decries as a contradiction of "the best laws" (p. 611).

The reason for the change in the valuation of fencing is unclear. It might be tempting to explain it in terms of technological obsolescence, e.g., to assume that the development of firearms had relegated the blade to a marginal or symbolic status among men of war, allowing it to be seen mainly in relation to physical education and health. This would be a false assumption; firearm technology was still primitive in the first half of the nineteenth century, even though such weapons had been familiar to the upper echelons of society since the sixteenth century. As is so often the case, old and

fencing. Comparisons of lesson 132, on the "Palaestra" ("Die Fechtschul"), in early and later editions reveal marked contrasts. The early editions treat fencing, wrestling, and fist-fighting in one lesson, which makes some sense, given that Comenius interprets the Palaestra as a school dedicated to teaching skills of combat, a "fechtschul" (i.e., a "fight school" [broad usage], a "fencing school" [narrow usage], context indicating which usage was intended). If this ambiguity was not confusing to seventeenth-century German readers, it presented a problem when Charles Hoole translated "Die Fechtschul" as the "The Fencing School" in the first English edition (London, 1659). That is, he elected the narrow usage where the broad was required. Hence, where the German has "fist-fighters" (i.e., boxers), Hoole has "Hood-winked fencers" fighting "with their fists in a ridiculous strife, to wit, with their eyes covered" (p. 269). Such are the pitfalls of translation.

Comenius's treatment of "Die Fechtschul" is essentially descriptive, striking a judgmental note only in relation to the blind-folded boxers, whose struggle he deems "lächerlich" (laughable or ridiculous). It may be surprising that the lesson content is not negative, given Comenius' role as an ecumenical clergyman, a man of peace, and living as he did at a time when blades were the principal weapons wielded horribly against human flesh—to puncture, maim, and kill. The high culture of the blade associated with the refinements of the palazzo, which seems to be Gaugler's preferred milieu, and the world for which Castiglione wrote, was alien to that of Comenius and to the values he sought to foster.

Substantially revised and augmented editions of *Orbis* (*Neuer Orbis Pictus fer die Jugend*) prepared by Jacob Eberhard Gailer first appeared in 1832. These editions show a marked change in the treatment of fencing, as evident in lesson 275, "Der Fechtmeister" ("The fencing master," "Le maitre d'armes," "Di gladiandi magister").

new technologies continued side by side: "The army is divided into Infantry and Cavalry," writes Gailer in the lesson on the Soldier. "The arms of the Infantry are the musket with the bayonet, and the sword; those of the Cavalry swords, pistoles, and carabines." (p.342).

Author attitude rather than the development of a competing weapons technology may explain the outlook on fencing represented in Gailer's *Neuer Orbis Pictus*. Or perhaps the author simply decided to divide the subject into two categories—personal and social—with fencing assigned to personal development sans reference to social context. Gailer knew, nonetheless, that sword skills acquired through fencing might for many men eventually play out in military circumstances. This is suggested in lesson 151 on "Die Schlacht" ("The battle"), where, after "muskets are fired off" and lengthy cannonades, all contenders still standing must "engage in hand to hand" (p. 347). Hoole had phrased it more explicitly, "they fight hand to hand with pikes and swords" (p. 287).

Fencing was not necessarily associated directly with the military or military purposes, but it might be. On this point, Gaugler recounts the establishment of military fencing masters schools in Italy after the middle of the nineteenth century. The story articulates with developments in the political unification of Italy (p. 167).

Besides attention to continuity and change in fencing and careful review of fencing manuals, Gaugler also offers vivid historical anecdotes that bring characters to life. There is Signor Rocco, an Italian living in London during the sixteenth century, who runs a "Colledge" of fencing, which he furnishes luxuriously in a manner deemed appropriate to an elite clientel. Or Jean-Louis Michel, poor Haitian mulatto boy, who, during the early decades of the nineteenth century, becomes a career soldier in France, then achieves national fame as a fencing master.

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Our National Championships Bring Out the Worst in Equipment Mistakes

A further look at some terrible things encountered recently by our National armorers.

Some people keep doing things they shouldn't do. I suppose I'm ungrateful to complain, of course. As with the preacher who would have nothing to say if everybody reformed, such people's boo-boos are the grist for my mill. Here are a few more—some new, most old but still lively—terrible things that I have observed people doing recently, at all sorts of level of competition.

So the weapon feels loose. It's usually a foil, but it could be anything. This complaint tends to occur more often with foils, perhaps because epee fencers have generally got a better grasp of what's necessary, and saber fencers, without their capteurs, can forget all about it. (Have I stepped on any toes?) So, put in a washer, says somebody. And a washer goes in. Ah, but where? Of all the places that a washer can be put where it will not do too much good, there is always just under the pommel of a French handle. Not that it won't be of some use there, especially if there is a misfit, a gap, say, preventing the pommel from being screwed down really hard. However, that's not exactly what we normally mean when we say put a washer in the foil. Most people, if only by observing what came out of the assembly they've got, know enough to get the washer into the orthopedic handle, on the tang, below the nut. And if you have ever got one in there alongside the tang, and not over it, you will not likely make that mistake a second time. But what can be said for a washer down below the handle itself? Well, it's not a really good idea, is it? Consider that the wire coming in is going to have to stay out of its way—assuming that the assembler had the sense to get the wire through the washer as well as the bracket in the first place. And it offers just another item to damage the wire next time the thing loosens up again, eh?

Suppose furthermore that the washer has been put between the bracket and the bell guard. Once again, what about the wire? I have seen all these apologies for assembly carried to a competition within the last year.

The danger of cutting the wire is why you don't really want to do that sort of thing. For the same reason, you don't want to put the guard onto the blade so that the wire is running down the side of the blade. When it comes into the guard, there is really no place for the wire to hide; it's going to be a goner in no time. The FIE really thinks that the wire in a foil belongs on top, despite several years' successful experience with the wire on the bottom (mostly in Europe). So that's

where you are supposed to put 'em.

Again foil: your tape at the tip area is wearing out; it shows gaps. You need to replace it, since bare metal showing along there may—not invariably, but it may—prevent your touches from registering by shorting around the point switch. So you fetch out the roll of tape and slap on some more. (You will probably “borrow” the tape, too. How many fencers ever repay the tape they have “borrowed,” I wonder?) What you will probably not do is get all the old tape off there, but just slap the new layer on top of how many partial earlier layers. Have you ever thought about the extent to which all that extra weight out there at the end of your foil throws off all the delicacy of your point control? What's that you say? You don't have any of that, so it doesn't matter. Could be.

A note for those who doubt that extra weight can affect a foil, or perhaps are inclined to question the extent of the influence. Many years ago, I happened to visit an educational institution (nameless here to protect the guilty) where there was only recreational (intra-mural, perhaps) fencing instruction. I looked at, and handled the foils, all nonelectric, that they were using. I had never seen anything quite like them. Every one had a half inch surgical adhesive tape band spiraled up the full length of the blade from the guard to the tip. About half the metal was on view; the rest was tape. I have never handled anything more klutzy in my life. I asked what was that. The instructor, who seemed never to have had any actual fencing experience, assumed that was normal: it was a requirement, he said, of their athletic director; if a blade broke, the pieces would be tethered together. Ah, so that was it. I recommend, if you have any doubts, take a few minutes, use a bit of a roll of tape and see just what that does to a foil.

Your point (foil or epee) doesn't feel very smooth. Lubricate it. You will do well to avoid 3-in-1 oil, say, and definitely keep away from graphite—no matter that the fellow at the hardware store says it's great on locks. Most cases of really appreciable roughness in tips, both foil and epee, tend to come from dented or otherwise misshapen barrels. Go after that first. If you still must lubricate, try to find one of the Teflon-based formulas: e.g., Triflow, Break-Free.

If you are one of the advanced operators who wants to re-wire your own or others' weapons, again foil or epee, I hope you are aware that the wire(s), even with the cloth insulation stripped off, may still have a layer of lacquer insulation remaining. Buff up the wire with a bit of emery cloth to be sure you have it really clean. Burning off insulation, as so frequently practiced, is an undesirable approach; with some of the wires we get—and you can't tell till the damage is done—the fire may make the wire brittle and too easily breakable when you have to bend it into place.

Since this is a listing of things that people are still doing that they shouldn't, let me stick one dart in some of our referees. When using the epee shim, there is absolutely no need to rotate the shim around the tip, thus putting some wear on it. If the shim fits in properly and projects on the other side, then a simple down pressure is the test for the whole point. If the shim is one of those very small not-even-half-moon cut-out affairs, then there is justification for applying it on two sides, or three, if you're gung-ho. But there is still no excuse for leaning on the tip, trying to force a failure. That way you demand of the weapon a standard beyond what the FIE has set. Do you think you're better than the FIE? Well, let's not get into that.

And while we're at it: another thing that people keep forgetting. Put your name on your stuff; even for domestic competition.

Fluid Replacement: ACSM Guidelines

The American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM) recommends a regimen of fluid replacement during exercise.

The American College of Sports Medicine (ACSM) has developed specific guidelines for the maintenance and restoration of proper hydration before and during exercise. Muscles are 75% water and in a dehydrated state they will become less responsive and tend to cramp. The ACSM's position is "that adequate fluid replacement helps maintain hydration and, therefore, promotes the health, safety and optimal physical performance of individual participating performance in regular physical activity." These recommendations are endorsed by the United States Olympic Committee Division of Sports Medicine and can be easily applied.

Swaka documented in 1992 that the athlete who enters in competition in a dehydrated state is at a disadvantage. To offset this athletes must maintain proper hydration levels on a daily basis. "It is recommended that individuals consume a nutritionally balanced diet and drink adequate fluids during the 24 hour period before an event, especially during the period that includes the meal prior to exercise" according to the ACSM guidelines. In 1984 Swaka documented that exercising in the heat accentuates the performance impairing effects of dehydration. This can apply to fencing due to the several layers of required protective clothing that ultimately retains heat.

For training and competition the recommendation is to drink about 17 ounces of fluid approximately 2 hours before exercise. This will ensure that your hydration level is adequate and also allows time for the excretion of excess ingested water. While training, the recommended amount of fluid is 4.6 liters daily (or just under 5 quarts). Research has shown that relying on voluntary fluid consumption during the day rarely meets this level and leads to entering into competition in a dehydrated state. Remember to drink even when you are not thirsty to keep from dehydrating. To ensure you're getting enough fluid, drink from a refillable container throughout the day that holds a measurable amount of liquid. For example,

Tupperware quart sized "sippy-bottles" can be found in most supermarkets. Finally, remember to monitor the color and volume of urine. Infrequent and dark colored urine may indicate dehydration. When properly hydrated your frequency and color of urination during training, competition and off days should be the same.

As for during exercise, the American College of Sports Medicine states "athletes should start drinking early and at a regular intervals in an attempt to consume fluids at a rate sufficient to replace all the water lost through sweating or consume the maximal amount that can be tolerated." In other words, in training and competition, drink like a fish! Research has shown that even low amounts of dehydration (a 2% loss of body weight) can impair performance, so drink as much as you can while fencing and do not wait until you're thirsty.

The first step to maintaining proper levels of hydration is to drink, the second step is to make sure that the fluids are getting absorbed in the body. Fluids that are slightly cool, 59° to 72°F, are absorbed the best. Furthermore, the ACSM noted that drinks that taste better and that contain sodium (0.5-0.7 grams per liter of water) will be consumed in greater amounts than plain water. Sodium "promotes fluid retention and the possibility of preventing hyponatremia." (Hypo-natremia, a condition when there is n't enough sodium

relative to the amount of fluid present. It is well documented that drinking only water during prolonged exercise can create this life threat-

ening imbalance.) In addition, better tasting drinks are more palatable and the presence of sodium and other minerals will stimulate the body's thirst mechanism - just like eating salted popcorn at the movies makes you thirsty. Coaches take note here: to get your fencers to remain hydrated, use tasty drinks that contain sodium and other minerals.

The ACSM delineates different requirements for maintaining hydration for exercise lasting under one hour and for intense exercise lasting longer. For shorter exercise periods - less than one hour - "there is little evidence of physiological or physical performance differences between consuming a carbohydrate-electrolyte drink or plain water." For periods of activity longer than one hour the recommendation is the "addition of proper amounts of carbohydrates and/or electrolytes to a fluid replacement solution. Carbohydrates can be sugars (glucose or sucrose) or starch (e.g. maltodextrin)." Look for sports drinks that supply about 60 grams of carbohydrates per quart. Over 75 grams per quart (approximately one liter) run the risk of creating gastrointestinal upset. Be aware that high doses of fructose when taken alone has been shown to cause vomiting and diarrhea so be sure that sports drinks which contain fructose are blended with other carbohydrates such as sucrose, glucose and maltodextrin. For fencers, this breaks down to drinking primarily

water during shorter workouts and bouts, yet during competitions a source of carbohydrate is definitely needed to maintain energy levels throughout the day.

After exercise, liquids are necessary to replace both lost fluids and nutrients. Sweat contains water, sodium, chloride, magnesium and other minerals. Athletes who exercise in excess of two hours per day can lose considerable amounts of nutrients commonly called 'electrolytes.' Low levels of these electrolyte minerals will lead to cramping and loss of coordination. The rapid and complete replacement of electrolyte minerals found in muscle is essential in accelerating the recovery from training and competition. In this regard the ACSM recommends to "drink at least one pint of fluid for every pound of body weight" lost through sweat during exercise.

The bottom line is to maintain proper hydration on a daily basis and to fully and rapidly replace the fluid and nutrients lost during exercise. Water alone is fine for short workouts, however, to recover from training more than once a day, in warm climates, during competition or from long workouts, electrolytes as well as carbohydrates need to be replenished. Hopefully this brief overview will assist USFA members to maintain proper hydration levels as it is directly related to performance. The complete position stand of the American College of Sports Medicine is published in *MEDICINE AND SCIENCE IN SPORTS EXERCISE*, volume 28, 1996.

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The Sport Science and Technology Committee of the United States Fencing Association has been working actively to develop sport psychology programs specifically for the fencer. The first of these is "Sport Psychology Test Profiling" which uses psychological assessment devices to measure attributes and abilities linked to success as a fencer. This program was developed initially for work with elite athletes, but is now available to the general membership. 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Hungarian Rhapsody

In the 1999 Veterans World Championships, twelve Americans made finals, five came away with medals and one became a world champion.

The latest step on the ladder that American veteran fencers are rapidly ascending was in Siofok, Hungary, where the 1999 World Veterans Championships were held from August 20-22. You may recall that last year in La Chaux-de-Fonds, Switzerland, when four events were held, Americans were very successful: Kazimieras Campe became the world champion in 60+ mens epee and Robert Hurley was a finalist in the same event. In Siofok, where the championships were expanded to ten events, America again crowned a world champion and our overall performance far surpassed the triumphs achieved in La Chaux-de-Fonds.

The USA won five medals in Siofok, highlighted by the 50+ mens sabre in which Ray Sexton III won the world championship and Alex Kovacs and Larry Pinkus took home bronze medals. The American prowess in sabre was further punctuated by Dr. Calvert Schlick, Jr., who capped the Americans' surprisingly strong showing in sabre with a silver medal in the 60+ mens sabre event. Then Mary Annavedder became the first ever American woman to medal at the Veteran World Championships when she won a bronze medal in 60+ womens epee. Overall, twelve members of the American team made it to the final of eight in their various events, five came away with medals and one became a world champion.

I wasn't there in Siofok to personally witness what happened, so I'm unable to give you a round by round, blow by blow account of the competition. But, I have talked to a number of people who were with the American team in Hungary in an effort to gather some of their general impressions about the Worlds. First of all, we have to remember that it was only the second official World Veteran Championships and the event is still in its relative infancy and sometimes experiences growing pains, e.g., the expansion from four to ten events and the increase from three to four competitors allowed from a country in each event.

My composite, secondhand impression is that the American team was generally pleased with the organization of the Worlds and the

hospitality of their Hungarian hosts, but perhaps not quite prepared for some of the peripheral surprises related to hotel accommodations, registration processes and the availability of sundries in an Eastern European country which only ten years ago was firmly locked behind the Iron Curtain. However, as the medal count will testify, the Americans adapted quite well to their new surroundings.

It began with an opening ceremony that featured Hungarian folk dancing and a welcoming speech by FIE President Rene Roch. The culmination for many was Ray Sexton III being cheered on to a world championship by his own group of Hungarian volunteers carrying "Hooray for Ray!" signs, who early on in the competition adopted him as their fencing hero. I'd say those folks know how to pick a winner!...I'm also told that another, lesser known American victory in international friendship was achieved by Debrah Bourque, a true friend of fencing, who worked as a volunteer massage therapist on Americans as well as on fencers from other countries who greatly appreciated her skills.

From all accounts, the Veteran Worlds were well attended: often with three to four-hundred people in the audience and finals that completely filled the stands. The audience also witnessed a new format for veteran events: the ten-touch direct elimination bout in all weapons. This format, which will apparently become the standard for domestic and international veteran competitions, features two three-minute rounds with a minute of rest in between the rounds.

According to Mac Garret, who was the hardworking team manager for the USA in Siofok, another change that the FIE is considering is the relaxation of some of the restrictions on medications for veterans who can verify their prescribed requirement with a physician's certification. Mac also said that the FIE Veterans Committee decided in Siofok to defer the decision on including womens sabre in the Worlds until a future meeting of the Committee, possibly in December 1999. The FIE Veterans Committee is going to

recommend that a veterans representative be named as a permanent representative to the FIE Congress.

The site and the date for the next Veteran World Championships has not yet been determined. Apparently, the FIE Veterans Committee would like to hold the World Championships annually except for every fourth year when the World Masters Games are to be held (The next World Masters Games are scheduled for Melbourne, Australia, in 2002). At the present time, no organizing group has yet stepped forward to ask for the World Championships in 2000, but it can be hoped that someone will submit such a bid at the FIE Congress meeting in December 1999.

Jim Campoli, who finished seventh as a finalist in 60+ mens sabre in Siofok, intends to make sure that there is no uncertainty about the Worlds in 2001. He is preparing a bid to bring the Veteran World Championships to South Florida in 2001. Jim is coordinating with

the USFA on the administrative nature of the bid, and he is working with the Tampa Sports Authority and other local groups to secure the financial support that would be necessary to bring the Veteran Worlds to the convention center in St. Petersburg. If you like suntan oil and palm trees interspersed with your fencing pleasures, and whether you are a veteran fencer or not, I'm sure that Jim would like to hear from any one who supports this major organizational endeavor.

One final observation on our veteran sport within a sport. Our 1998 and 1999 world champions, Kaz Campe and Ray Sexton III, were members of the American team that went to Germany in the fall of 1996 for a dual (duel?) meet with the German team.

An individual tournament in all weapons was held over the next two days in Kassel, Germany, that featured some of the best veteran fencers from both countries. The USA won two of the events: Ray took the gold in mens sabre and Kaz did the same in mens epee. As I look back now in hindsight, this was obviously an omen of even greater international success for these two competitors in the future. Their triumphs, as well as the success of the other Americans in the Veteran World Championships, leaves no doubt that the USA is up there in the vanguard with the traditional fencing powers as veteran

fencing establishes itself as a legitimate sport at the international level. A hearty round of applause for all of the American competi-

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Fencing Isn't Dueling, But ...

Is there an advantage to extending the arm fully before an attack? The age-old debate continues ...

Ferro in linea! (Blade in line) Whether for foil, epee, or even sabre, in the Italian school the classical fencing lesson always begins and ends with a straight thrust preceded by a command to place the blade in line. In the past it served as an important reminder to the duelist that when launching an attack, full extension of the arm was required, not just before reaching the target, but before the foot moved as well. Indeed, other elements of classical Italian theory and technique also bear testimony to the fact that while fencing may be enjoyed as a sport, its origins and development are deeply rooted in the practice of the duel.

In defining the attack, article 10 of chapter IIIC of the international rules governing fencing explains that, "The attack is the initial offensive action made by extending the arm and continuously threatening the opponent's valid surface." While this rule may seem clear enough, there has been disagreement as to what the word "extending" implies. The classical view has traditionally been that the sword arm must be extending "fully," an interpretation that would seem to be supported by article 233, 4 of chapter IVE 2, which states that, "a simple or compound action, forward movement or feint executed with a bent arm is not considered an attack, but rather a preparation, which lays itself open to the initiation of the offensive or offensive/defensive action of the opponent." Nevertheless, the contemporary view of article 10 interprets this rule to mean that the arm need not be extending fully, but only that it must begin to extend, or be in the process of extension, even if the extension is particularly slow. Which view is correct? Is there an advantage to either approach? What are the benefits - the risks?

Going back to the time when fencing was serious business we find in the treatises of the well known masters a number of instances in which these questions were addressed. In 1606 Nicoletto Giganti, in his treatise "Scola overo teatro," explained that when executing a thrust one must first extend the arm. A contemporary of Giganti, Ridolfo Capo Ferro, was in agreement. In "*Gran simulacro dell'arte e dell'uso della scherma*," he wrote that to deliver a thrust, the sword arm should be extended in a straight line. Attacking with a bent arm was considered a bad practice to which Salvator Fabris felt a need to draw particular attention. In "*Siienza [sic] e pratica d'arme*," he cautioned that "There are some who, wishing to attack with the point, launch the arm with violence to give it greater force, [but] such a manner is not good...[for] one may be wounded in the time of this withdrawal of the arm." His words appear to demonstrate with crystal clarity the reasoning that lies behind the caution of article 233, 4 against

with an arm that is not straight.

Of course, the sport of fencing is not the same thing as dueling. Like any other "game" it is governed by rules that define how the game is played. Interestingly, in the *Reglement d'escrime* of 1908, the "Bible" of modern French fencing, the execution of the lunge calls for the fencer to "Extend the right arm quickly and without stiffness, keeping the body immobile, ... Then carry the right foot forward..." Despite the weight of history however, the contemporary view that the arm needn't extend completely prevails. Fine. For the purpose of playing fencing simply as a game this view would be as acceptable as any other were it not for the fact that this interpretation produces its own particular problems.

In slowly extending the sword arm an attacker may hope to confuse an adversary and throw off his timing. When will the hostile blade arrive? Should the defender parry now - later? The attack is coming, perhaps at least in terms of foot movement, but what about the sword arm? Is it truly extending or does it just appear to be extending? Perhaps the attack is only in preparation and a counterthrust is appropriate. It's a difficult picture to analyze and the defender hasn't much time to decide what is going on. The trouble is, neither does the referee, and as two fencers vie to deceive each other with arm extensions that are slow, slower, or changing from slow to fast, fast to slow, and every conceivable variant in between, they run the risk of deceiving the referee as well.

The problem is well illustrated by the example of a fencer who, acknowledging that slow extension of the sword arm was "a very basic part of my [her] game," recently lost a bout to an adversary using the same tactic. Evidently, the referee tried to award priority correctly, but because of the subtle and deceptive nature of both fencers' slow extensions, he awarded priority on the basis of changes in the rates of acceleration of arm movement, not initial arm movement itself. The rules, of course, say nothing about "acceleration," but giving him the benefit of the doubt we must allow that this referee did his best with the difficult picture presented. More commonly, although arm extension is pivotal to awarding priority, slow extension of the arm fails to attract a referee's attention as effectively as footwork. Consequently, priority is not infrequently awarded without regard to arm extension at all.

Rendering good judgement is sufficiently difficult for any referee, and for any fencer, one adversary at a time is enough. Getting good calls on priority is made far easier when a fencer begins the attack by rapidly extending the sword arm and weapon into a straight line. The image presented to the referee is a clear, unequivocal picture that cannot be mistaken for anything other than an aggressive, determined, correctly executed attack. Instead of a confusing picture of insidiously moving arms, masked by the more dramatic motion of rapidly moving feet, the referee will be presented with an image that is as striking in its appearance as that seen by Dr. Faure, a witness to the Mores-Meyer duel in 1892. That Meyer lost his life is all the more tragic because he himself was the attacker. We don't know for certain whether his arm was bent, slowly extending, or changing in its rate of acceleration, but we do know that his blade never reached its mark and that his lunge carried him directly onto the Marquis' point. We also know how clear and dramatic was the picture etched in the doctor's memory: "I shall, however, remember all my life that, when the wound was inflicted, the sword and arm of the Marquis de Mores were in an absolutely horizontal position."



In recent years, Navy who once had powerful fencing has dropped their program. Army supports their fencers at the club status only. The only military academy that offers men's and women's varsity fencing is the United States Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

For any military fencer the World Military Championships or CISM (Conseil International du Sport Militaire) is a goal. This year was the 24th World Military Fencing Championships, held in conjunction with the 2nd World Military Games in August in Zagreb, Croatia an event second in size only to the Olympics.

In May I was contacted by two Army Captains, James Gregory, a world class competitor in modern pentathlon and a fencer with the Special Forces, Thomas Thliveris. They asked, and I agreed to be the

coach for the United States Team. Team members, who may represent all branches of the military, consisted of: Spc. Chad Senior; Spc. Brett Weatherbie and Capt. James Gregory; Maj. Teresa Orcutt; Lt. Nicole Mustilli; and Capt. Tanya Hurwitz in epee. Capt. Thomas Thliveris; Pv2. Frets Olivares; Lt. Nicole Mustilli; Capt. Tanya Hurwitz and Lt. Zoe Hawes in foil. Comdr. Joshua Runyan; Spc. Thomas Sirico and Capt. Steven Lygren in sabre. The team performed extremely well, doing better than anticipated and finishing with the best, US result in several years.

Croatia is a small country of four million people. The capitol, Zagreb is only 200 miles from Serbia. The population is well educated, very hospitable and generous. Initially, there had been concerns about the living conditions and security. The events were ex-
